BRIDGETOWN MAN IN LUCK

Henry T. Ross a Lawyer is Slated for Important Position in Dominion Finance Department.

OTTAWA, July 27.—(Special).—With reference to the Canadian grant of \$100,000 towards the San Francisco relief fund, of which \$80,000 has already been sent to the Red Cross and Relief Association of San Francisco authorities. The government finance, stated that the government will send the balance of \$20,000 to the same authority. Some individual applications were made to the government for assistance and some complaint made as to the administration of the relief funds by the San Francisco authorities. The government, Mr. Fielding said, held that, as the \$100,000 was granted for the general relief of sufferers without respect to any class, they did not feel at liberty to deal with any individual case or with any particular class of sufferers, but felt that the whole amount should go into the general fund, relying upon the authorities of San Francisco and upon the public opinion of the community to see that the distribution is properly made and that all classes of sufferers share in the distribution. Besides this grant of \$100,000 for the relief fund, the government made provisions through the British consular general at San Francisco for assisting such Canadians as wished to return to Canada. As previously announced, J. M. Conway, deputy minister of finance, has resigned his position, and his resignation is to take effect on the first of November. It is understood that Mr. Fielding has decided to promote to the deputyship a member of the present staff, T. C. Bonington, for the appointment of an assistant deputy minister. For this place it is understood that the gentleman chosen for the position is Henry T. Ross, barrister of Bridgewater, N. S., who is at present acting as secretary for the insurance commission. Mr. Ross is a Nova Scotian barrister of seventeen years standing.

I. C. R. MEN TO SEE MINISTER

They Will Ask Hon. Mr. Emerson to Amend Recent Pass Order.

MONCTON, July 26.—Provincial Constable Belyea is in the city today distributing summonses in Scotch Act cases being brought by his superior, Magistrate McEwen, at Shediac. In all he has served papers on four parties. In addition to this he has summoned three Scotch parties to appear before the court on the charge of Scotch Act violation. The Scotch parties summoned are Wm. T. Thibault, two cases; Eustache LeBlanc, two cases; and Nap. LeBlanc. The minister of railways, who is expected in Moncton on Saturday, is said to be waited on by a delegation of I. C. R. employees and asked for information respecting the suppression bill which the minister proposed for the I. C. R. employees. Mr. Emerson will also be asked by I. C. R. employees and friends on their behalf to modify the recent pass order, which went into effect about ten days ago. The feeling among the employees that the pass question is very strong and pressure will be brought to bear upon the minister to make some reasonable concessions. It is admitted that the privilege was abused, but it is felt by the employees that the innocent should not be made to suffer with the guilty on this account.

It is stated that an investigation as to the theft of money from the I. C. R. freight in transit over the C. N. R. has changed that articles of freight of different kinds have been tampered with, but the principal cause of complaint is in the matter of liquor. Very frequently cases of liquor upon being delivered here are found to be short, and it is charged that I. C. R. employees, to some extent at least, are responsible for this state of things.

Mrs. E. B. Hooper, wife of the Rector of St. John's church, left today for Duck Cove, St. John, to spend a few weeks.

Hiram Edgett, one of Moncton's oldest residents, is lying dangerously ill at his home on Wesley street. His son, Rev. Gilbert Edgett, has been summoned home from Maine.

Walter Shaffer, engineer on a steamer running between Boston and a southern point is visiting friends in Moncton.

W. R. Townsend, who spent two or three summers in Moncton, and who was expected here this year to continue his boating operations for oil just west of the city, it is learned, was a heavy sufferer from recent earthquake disease in San Francisco. Mr. Townsend owned considerable property on the west side of the city, and in a recent letter to a Moncton friend, he states it has been practically wiped out. Mr. Townsend spent his summer boating for oil on an area taken up about half a mile east of Moncton. He is interested in the Beausvein railway and coal mines.

LOST IN THE FOG

Remarkable Story Told by Guests at an Up River Dance

Wednesday evening a dance took place at Whitehead, which is situated some distance up the river, and all present enjoyed themselves until four o'clock in the morning, when they prepared to return to their respective lodging houses. Some of those present did not live over a quarter of a mile from the scene of the fog, but despite that fact the land fog was so dense that for hours they were unable to find their residences. Others lived a mile or two distant from the scene and report that it was ten o'clock in the morning before they reached their homes.

"It may seem very singular that we were lost for six hours in the land fog," said one who was in the crowd, "but it is true, as I never experienced the like in my life."

FOUND DEAD IN SHAFT

NEW YORK, July 27.—Francis R. Reynolds, a bookmaker and well known racing man was found lying at the bottom of an air shaft in the Hotel Martin, early this morning. The man was unconscious when found and died before an ambulance surgeon from the New York hospital reached him. Reynolds' home was in St. Louis.
