with stepping nimbly in and out of his rival's range and coming up unexpectedly under Welsh's swinging arms to rest contentedly on the Englishman's shoulder and there grin broadly at the lightweight champion's futile efforts to hit him.

Kilbane showed on frequent occasions, however, that, when the whim seized him, he was capable of driving his opponent before him with a succession of heavy blows to the face and stomach, mostly to the face, and his furries in this direction, which were few for the greater part of the bout, made the crowd yell wildly in his honor.

The featherweight champion, smiling broadly throughout, took particular pleasure, however, in showing off his cleverness to the crowded house, and each time he made Welsh miss he laughed heartily. In fact, Kilbane seemed to be losing valuable time in indulging his mirth, for there were several occasions when openings to shoot home a heavy blow to the face or body went unnoticed by him.

When he was not engaged in ably ducking and sidestepping Welsh's almost frantic efforts to land on him, the Cleveland boxer was giving his utmost attention to showing the spectators just how he could tie up the lightweight champion in knots of his own making and then counter cleverly and effectively. Especially in the latter rounds did Kilbane unleash his power to outbox and outstep the lightweight championship title holder, and there were times when the efforts of Welsh to land seemed ludicrous to those about the ringside who had seen him perform against best experienced and clever boxers than Kilbane.

Knockout Blow Never in Sight.
At no stage of the match, though, could it be said that either man was in dire need of medical attention. The possibility of a knockout blow ending a bout in a local ring was never more remote than last night. Welsh, true to his ring traditions, clung to the coaching defence that at times baffled even the wily attempts of Kilbane.

In the matter of heavy hitting and reckless aggressiveness, however, the contest fell far short of its potential interest, and there were many times when a huge throng of spectators, occupying every available nook of the spacious clubhouse—and some that were not salable—yelled for the boxers to put more action into their efforts.
