

SPY WAS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE EXPLOSION

Rome, Oct. 18.—The Italian government has issued a proclamation offering a reward of 200,000 lire (\$20,000) for information which will result in the conviction of the German or Austrian spy who caused an explosion on board the battleship Leonardo da Vinci. The dreadnaught was sent to the bottom by an explosion while at anchor in Tarento harbor on Sept. 12 last. The commission appointed to enquire into the disaster reported that the explosion was undoubtedly the result of design, and was caused by a spy on board the vessel. Three hundred lives were lost on the battleship.

A TRIBUTE TO BRITAIN

A striking tribute to Britain's war government was paid by Sir Hamar Greenwood, Bart., during the course of his speech before the Canadian Club of Toronto. "I am ready to criticize the British government on the floor of parliament. I will not criticize it here, but I will say that its record, reinforced by the nation's patriotism behind it, will go down as one of the marvels of the history of the world."

Britain is united as never before, the speaker showed. "You have doubtless heard a lot here of the 'conscientious objector'. Well, the conscientious objector, all told, never reached a thousand, and the great majority of them are now in the ranks as first rate British soldiers."

Sir Hamar's reference to the financing of the war was full of interest. Britain, he said, was the only member of the allies who was in a position to impose additional taxes after the war had begun. It was upon her that the burden of supplying men, munitions and money for the continuance of the struggle was daily more and more being laid. France's resources have almost all been taxed to the limit. Russia, he declared, was inexhaustible as regards men, but only inexhaustible in that "The Russian army today is fighting in khaki, and those khaki uniforms all go from the mother country."

As an instance of the whole-hearted sacrifice made by Britain, he stated that motoring as a pastime had been given up. "There are more motor cars running on the streets of Toronto today than in the whole of England. Cars have either been stored or sent by the tens of thousands over to France."
