SOLBIER ATTACKS PRINCE OF WALES?

French Corporal Enters Inn and Fires on Officers

Wife Was a Waitress - He Believed She Had Been Flirting With Customers

Paris, Sept. 28.—(Correspondence)—Last week the Prince of Wales, while taking tea in an inn at a British station near Ypres, was shot in the arm by a French corporal. The attendant at the inn is an attractive looking young woman who was passing as an unmarried girl under the name of Barthou, but, as a matter of fact, she is married to a corporal in a French hussar regiment named Huguet.

Mr. Barthou had many admirers, among the British staff officers, among whom the inn became a popular resort for tea, or other refreshments when any of the staff had visit this corner of the British lines. News of this state of affairs reached the husband, who became furiously jealous. Huguet wrote to his wife to say that stories about her flirtation with British officers had reached him, and that he had been unfaithful to him, he would shoot her and then shoot himself.

As a matter of fact, the stories that had reached Huguet were grossly exaggerated. The British staff officers treated Mr. Barthou properly and between none of them and the pretty Briton was there any levity of conduct. One young officer, indeed, on the staff, who had fallen very much in love with her, proposed to her and had ceased, after her refusal to marry him, to visit the inn.

On last Saturday the husband obtained twenty-four hours leave from the trenches and unexpectedly turned up at the inn where his wife was employed, at about five in the afternoon. The Prince of Wales and another staff officer were having tea in the inn at the moment. It appears that Huguet watched his wife talking to the prince and his companion and then was seized with a blind rage. He rushed into the room and without a word of warning fired two shots in succession, one at his wife and another at the two staff officers. Then he turned the weapon on himself.

The prince and his companion sprang at him, but the corporal fired before he could be seized and wounded him in the neck. The Prince of Wales was wounded in his arm just above the wrist. The corporal was taken to a field hospital by the Prince of Wales in his motor car, where the prince also had his wound dressed.

The prince then proceeded to headquarters and reported the whole incident to the commander-in-chief. The corporal, under military law, is liable to be shot, but no official notice will probably be taken of the incident. The corporal's wife almost immediately after the incident left the inn and went to a hospital where her husband was taken and is looking after him herself.

Rec'tor Believes Intruder a Burglar and Shoots Him

New Orleans, Oct. 13—Rev. Byron Holley, rector of St. George's Episcopal Church shot and killed Lansing Pearsall, son of a prominent railroad man here. Dr. Holley told the police he shot Pearsall, thinking he was a burglar.

About 9 o'clock in the morning Dr. Holley telephoned police headquarters that he had shot a man in the rectory study. The minister told the police that while in his office, he heard some one in his study adjoining. Taking a pistol he stepped into the study and saw a man near the door.

"The intruder did not answer my questions as to who he was, and when he wanted," Dr. Holley said, "and when I ordered him out he made a motion as if to draw a weapon. I fired and the man fell."

Several hours later the man was identified at the morgue by Nathan G. Pearsall, claim agent of the Tennessee & Pacific Railway, as his son Lansing, 23 cents. There were eleven pearls in one year old. No reason for the young man's presence in the rectory could be given by his parents or friends. Dr. Holley said he had never seen Pearsall before.

Police found a window in the rectory parlor had been opened. Young Pearsall lived several blocks from the Holy home in the next street.

NEW POLICY AT THE GEM IS POPULAR

Double Bill at Every Show, Matinee and Evening—Getting Ready For "Neal of the Navy"

The new policy of giving all feature productions with double bills afternoon and evening at the Gem Theatre is attracting a large and increasing audience. The policy which was inaugurated this week has met with hearty favor. At yesterday's show the feature, a two part episode including a two part Lubin Drama "Money, Money, Money," a stirring story of commercial life and the temptations of those who have the daily handling of enormous sums. There was also the show "The Exploits of Elaine" and the serial "The Survivors." Special emphasis is now being placed upon the engine bills and long runs as a result of additional features at both afternoon shows.

MORNING NEWS OF WAR

In the reply to Serbia's announcement of the Bulgarian invasion Greece declines to come to her assistance on the grounds that the existing treaty had in view only the preservation of the balance of power among the Balkan states and not the contingency of a general conflagration. In the present situation, the note continues, Greece might destroy her relations without hope of saving Serbia and that common interests demand that the Greek forces be kept in reserve for a better use later. The note concludes with the statement that Greece will maintain an attitude of neutrality, but that she will give Serbia every assistance compatible with the Greek's international position.

Delcasse, Deliberator of France, has resigned owing to ill health, and nervous exhaustion and his portfolio has been taken by Premier Viviani. When the announcement was made to the chamber of deputies a vote of confidence in the government was adopted. Edwin Samuel Montague, financial secretary of the treasury, discussing the budget in the British House of Commons yesterday, said that the people must be prepared to put half their income at the disposal of the government, either in the form of taxes or loans. He reviewed the tremendous war expenditures involving an outlay for this purpose of two-thirds of the ordinary estimated revenue and warned the nation that only strictest economy on the part of the individual would make it possible to meet the demands of the war.

Eight persons were killed and thirty-four wounded in the latest Zeppelin raid over London.

A Zeppelin dropped five bombs over Chateau Thierry, on the Marne, last night but did no damage.

Serbia may publish the terms of her treaty with Greece because of the course the latter has taken.

Bulgaria charges that Serbians were the aggressors in their first clash, on last Monday.
