In the change recommended in the King's title, the term "United King-dom" disappears. The change, it is dom" disappears. The change, it is explained, is necessitated by the Irish Free State becoming a dominion. The new title will read:

"George V., by the grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the seas, king, de-fender of the faith, emperor of India." On the position of a governor-general, the report observes, "in our opinion it is essential consequence of the equality of status existing among the nbers of the British commonwealth nations that the governor-general of nations that the government of a dominion is a representative of the crown, holding in all essential reets the same position in relation to administration of public affairs in dominion as is held by His Majesty the King in Great Britain, and that he is not a representative or agent of His Majesty's government in Great Britain or any part of that governthe King in Great Britain, and

The report recommends, however, the appointment of a special committee to consider statutory provisions authorizing disallowance of dominion legislation; the competence of the dominion parliaments to give their legis-lation extra-territorial effect; the prac-ticability and most convenient method each Dominion Parliament should have power to give extra-territorial opera-tion to legislation, where such operation to legislation, where such opera-tion is ancilliary to the provision for peace and order and good government of the dominion; the principles under-lying the colonial laws, the validity of the act of 1865 and the extent to which any provisions of that should be re-pealed in the light of the existing re-turns between the various members of the British commonwealth.




