## MANY TOYS ARE MADE ANEW FOR POOR KIDDIES

**Rover Scouts Have More  
Than 500—Valuable  
Assistance Given**

There are going to be some very happy boys and girls in Saint John when the Boy Scouts toy shop yields up its storehouse of gifts and they are distributed to the toyless homes throughout the city, accompanying the well-filled stocks of The Times-Star Empty Stocking fund. The Rover Scouts have been busy for several weeks with transformation acts, mending, painting, gluing, fixing, patching and doing fine carpentry stunts in re-making wrecks of toys which have come from many interested friends who have been willing to part with damaged toys in order that the toyless children may have pleasure of Christmas.

More than 500 of these battered specimens have been received up to the present time, and the Scouts will still receive all that offer up to Dec. 20. Then the close season is on and there will be a big rush to get everything mended and as good as new before the day of day arrives.

### GIVES USE OF PLANT.

The Rover Scouts have been greatly helped in their kindly undertaking by Drury & Son, of Waterloo street. Mr. Drury has placed his carpenter shop, with its full equipment of tools and machinery, at the disposal of the Rover Scouts each evening, and has also given the use of his team for collecting the toys.

Last night the Rover Den in the Beard of Trade building was a great place for young folk to see. It was almost bursting with its wonderfully varied assortment of toys, and quite a lot of these toys were already re-upholstered and glistening with new paint. Before they reached that stage, the Rover Scouts had fitted new wheels, explored mechanical depths, inserted new springs, had taken bits of one doll to attach to another doll, etc.

### SHOW SKILL.

In their work the Scouts have displayed ingenuity and skill that were amazing, and in the hundreds of finished toys were almost everything that could come under that heading: Fine miniature automobiles all ready to go and having a horn to warn of their approach, sandy-anthracite, kiddie cars, cradles, rocking chairs, musical boxes, rocking horses, mechanical toys of many varieties, and many more. There is just one bit of work in which the Rovers have had to seek assistance. The dressing of the dolls is beyond them, and the Rothery Girls are beyond them.

**Local Branch Canadian Legion  
Opposes Proposed  
Private Member's Bill**

A strong protest to any attempt to abolish the preference for returned soldiers in civil service appointments was voiced at the first meeting of the executive of the newly formed Saint John branch of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., held last night. Yesterday announced that a private member in the Federal house would bring in a bill advocating the abolition of this preference. The executive went on record as utterly opposed to any such step, sending telegrams to the Prime Minister, the Saint John-Albert constituency members in the Federal House, Postmaster-General, Hon. P. J. Veniot, and Dr. J. H. King, Minister of Health, and the D. S. C. H.

The executive completed organization for the ensuing year and elected as additional members of the executive: J. H. Neal, George Reid and W. Donahue. Chairmen of committees were appointed as follows: House committee, Roy Wale; membership, George Reid; sports, J. V. Shea; entertainment, J. H. Neal; publicity, T. McKee; benevolent, J. C. Dwyer.

ORONOTO, Dec. 14.—A. B. White, prominent merchant of this community and secretary and treasurer of the St. John's branch of the Canadian Legion, died suddenly in his home here this evening at 9:30 o'clock.

Mr. White had been unwell for the past fortnight but had been about his store as usual today. He left the store about 9 o'clock this evening, apparently without warning of the nearness of the grim reaper, and was suddenly stricken in his home a short time afterward.

He was born in the state of Maine nearly 60 years ago but had resided in this place for the last 40 years. In the life of this community, he had been in business here for more than 30 years and was one of the leaders in the United Church in this place. He will be missed personally and in the activities of the community.

The deceased is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Armstrong, of Oronoto, and two sons, Arthur and George, of this place. He also leaves three brothers, Leslie, of Gagetown, and Stanley, N. B.

The funeral will be held from his late home here on Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock to the United church. Rev. Mr. Chapman, pastor, officiating.

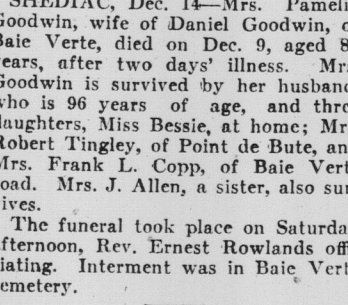
### Mrs. W. A. Campbell

## FATHER AND SON ARE BOTH U. S. ADMIRALS

**Only Once Before Has Stirling  
Family Navy Record Been  
Matched**

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 13.—The Stirling family of Baltimore, three generations of which are represented in the United States, are receiving congratulations on the nomination, by the President, of Rear Admiral Yates Stirling's son, Captain Yates Stirling, Jr., to be a rear admiral. This is only the second time in the history of the U. S. Navy that a father and son have held the rank of rear admiral.

"I knew that he would be an admiral some day," the elder admiral says. "I hoped he would become one while I was still on the retired list, and now he has received his appointment, and I am very glad."

Yates Stirling, 3rd, was graduated from the United States Naval Academy last June. He is a son of the man who has just been appointed a rear admiral. A fourth Stirling in the navy is Commander Archibald G. Stirling, another son of the retired admiral.

## WIFE RETURNS HER HUSBAND TO JAIL

**Refused Reward Offered by

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Dec. 15.—Elmer "Walk-a-Way" Decker, one of the most notorious criminals in the country, is back in his cell again, after being at liberty for two weeks. Mrs. Decker, who has been in the hands of the police since she was arrested, refused a \$100 reward for apprehending her husband.

"Prison's the best place for him," she explained. "Don't let him get away again. I don't want him at home."

Mrs. Decker, the mother of six children, had been in jail for a long time, and was now being held for apprehending her husband.

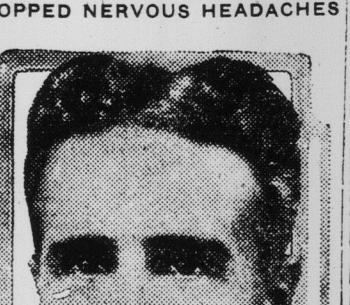

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## LIQUOR CONTROL IN N. S. MOOTED

**Sydney Despatch to New York  
Says Change in Law is  
Coming**

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—A special despatch to the New York Times from Sydney, Cape Breton, was the following: "Overthrow of prohibition and the return of liquor under Government control is coming in Nova Scotia within the next six months, according to a member of the Government, who says: 'In February of this year Premier Rhodes and his Cabinet held a conference with the Nova Scotia temperance forces, during which all the resources of the Government and the Attorney General's Department were placed at the disposal of prohibition workers. If, at the end of the year, they could not report satisfactory progress, they were told, the Cabinet would be obliged to abrogate the Nova Scotia Temperance Act and substitute more effective legislation. Three months have passed and conditions have not improved; in fact, they are not so good as they were. The belief is widespread among

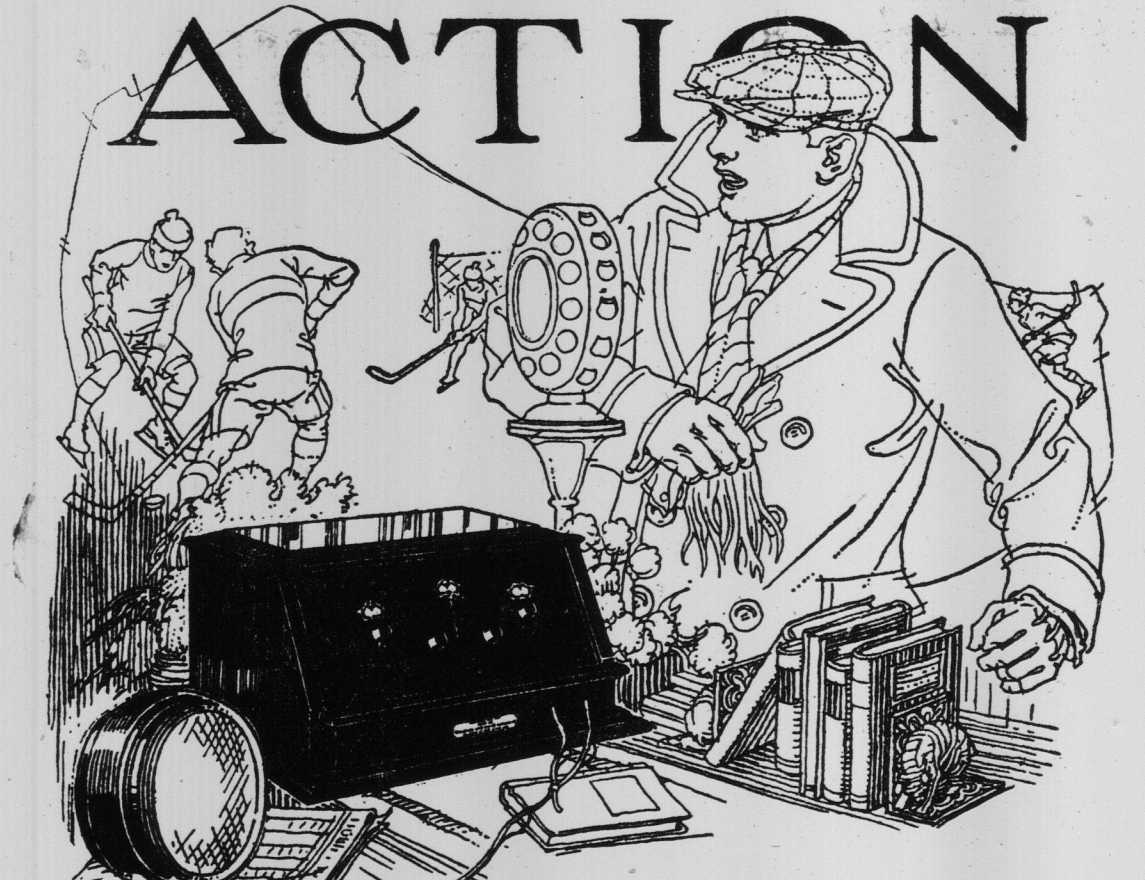
