Fables On Health

WHEN YOUR FEET ARE ACHING

SORE and aching feet are common with folk who walk quite a bit, or spend many hours standing.

Improper fitting shoes may be blamed, but with the best fitted shoe possible, often there is pain.

A good treatment for sore feet is the use of a strong solution of salt water at night.

After the feet have been soaked in the solution they should be sponged off with cold water, and massaged well. Then they should be bandaged with strips, saturated in a mixture of equal parts of witch-hazel, tannin and alcohol.

In the morning the feet should be sponged off again with cold water, and both shoes and stockings dented with powder made by mixing together one part salicylic acid, two parts of boric acid and two parts of talcum.

In addition to relieving the pain this treatment is intended to stop disagreeable perspiration.

Tired feet are much refreshed by being bathed in hot water. Rub-

bing them with alcohol or witch-hazel is also restful, especially for tender feet. This also tends to prevent perspiration.

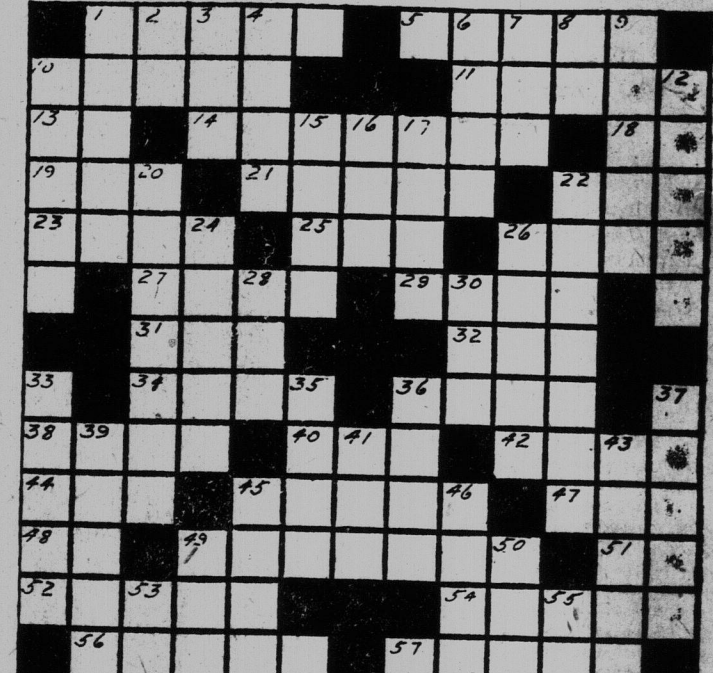

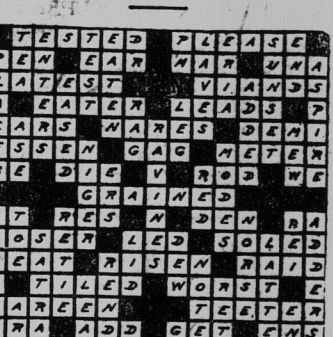
