

FAREWELL SAID BY REV. J. W. BRITTON

Minister of St. Matthew's Church
Leaves For Church in Nova
Scotia

Rev. J. W. Britton preached his farewell sermon in St. Matthew's church last night, closing a pastorate of about one year. He spoke of the pleasant associations of his ministry and his regret in leaving the friends he had made. He urged the congregation to pray earnestly for the work of the church and expressed the hope that Rev. Dr. J. A. Morrison, who was to be the preacher next Sunday, would be chosen as the next minister for the church.

Mr. Britton is to preach in Greenock church, St. Andrews, next Sunday and afterwards will leave to take up his new duties as minister of the Presbyterian church in Oxford, N. S.

In his sermon he spoke of the text I. Thessalonians, 5-21: "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good." He declared that although the Presbyterian Church had been wounded in the house of its friends it had still a glorious vision. He exhorted the congregation to stand fast in the faith and prayed for God's blessing to rest upon them. The choir sang two anthems with fine effect and Miss Irene Galbraith sang the solo, "God Be With You 'Till We Meet Again."

OPTIMISM MARKS OPENING SPEECHES

Speakers at Capital Fair Commencement See Better Times Ahead.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 13.—The Fredericton exhibition observed its seventieth anniversary and formally opened its gates for the 1925 fair Saturday night. The formal pronouncement of opening was made by Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier-designate of New Brunswick, who spoke after President W. S. Hooper, of the exhibition, and Hon. W. F. Todd, Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick. The proceedings were marked by heavy rain which drove those attending to take cover and prevented any extended view of the livestock and other exhibits which were not in buildings.

The keynote of the speeches delivered was optimism, all speakers holding out promise of improved conditions. Dr. Baxter stressed New Brunswick's opportunity to develop tourist business, advocating the formation of a province-wide organization on a voluntary basis which would undertake the development and encouragement of tourist traffic.

In the course of his remarks Dr. Baxter said that he would not be so poor a sport as not to acknowledge the great work which had been done by the outgoing administration in improving the highways of the province and making possible an influx of motor tourists.

HARVEST SERVICES.

Harvest thanksgiving services were held yesterday in All Saints' church, East Saint John, and in St. Bartholomew's church in Colebrook, conducted by A. L. Gardiner. Both churches were very beautifully decorated with harvest fruits and flowers. The East Saint John congregation service was held in the morning and a large offering was given. The St. Bartholomew's service was held in the evening. The church has just been newly decorated inside, the men of the congregation having carried out the work themselves. The W. A. had provided a new strip of linoleum and Miss Rhena Hayter had presented a beautifully worked white cloth for the communion table, which she had made herself. The new gifts were used for the first time last night.

Rev. James Dunlop, pastor of the Central Baptist church, and Rev. W. A. Robbins, pastor of the Ludlow street Baptist church, exchanged pulpits for the morning service yesterday.

Petition Relative to Winter Trains Being Circulated For Presentation to Railway.

A petition for a few changes in the suburban C. N. R. train schedule for the winter months to make the hours more convenient for the winter residents is being circulated at all stops from the city to Model Farm and has already been signed by many people. The paper asks that the suburban train leaving Saint John at 12:30 o'clock noon and reaching Hampton at 1:20 be continued, but that it be held at Hampton until 6:45 o'clock, making its arrival in town 7:45, instead of returning so as to reach the city at 2:30 in the afternoon; that the 10:30 train in the evening be held to 11 o'clock and that the Maritime Express, reaching the city at 2 o'clock, make the local stops from Hampton in.

REASON OF PETITION.

It is claimed by those fostering the petition that the changes would make very little trouble for the railway, the stopping of the Maritime being the only addition to the regular schedule, and would mean a great deal of added convenience to the winter residents. It is said that it will mean giving the people a chance to get to the city, go to shops or do their shopping and return at hours convenient for them.

The main complaint about the service as at present laid out is that coming to the city must either rush right back or stay in town for a period much longer than desired.

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BRIDGE COLLAPSES

Mishap Will Force Traffic Over
Viaduct to West
Bathurst.

BATHURST, Sept. 13.—A team of horses, attached to a sloop loaded with flour, and the driver were thrown into the harbor yesterday afternoon when one of the spans on the Station bridge collapsed. Allan Arsenau, the driver, was extricated from the debris with difficulty, with his clothes badly torn and one boot missing. The horses were freed from the wreckage and swam ashore. Considerable excitement prevailed for some time and the fire department was called to the scene.

BRIDGE COLLAPSED.

The team, belonging to W. J. Kent & Co., Ltd., was engaged in unloading a car of flour at the C. N. R. siding and hauling it to the company's warehouses in the rear of the store. According to Arsenau he was hauling fifty bags a trip and, just before coming onto the span that collapsed, met a car going toward the station. When about the middle of the span he felt the whole thing settle. Then the trusses wavered and the lower side of the bridge sagged outward, allowing the entire woodwork to settle with the loaded truck into the water.

Onlookers spread the alarm, and with the additional help the driver and his horses were soon rescued. Later some of the flour was salvaged and the sloop hauled to the bridge.

ANOTHER CAR ESCAPES.

A. S. Veniot was following the load of flour in a sedan, but escaped. He attributed his escape to the car which was coming in the opposite direction.
