

TO SERVE CHURCH ON NEW MAGAZINE

Associate Editors Are Appointed to Conduct Presbyterian Witness.

Rev. Dr. G. S. Carson and Rev. Dr. Robert Haddow have been appointed associate-editors of the new Presbyterian Church weekly, to be known as The Presbyterian Witness, which will be published by the board of Presbyterian publications, Toronto. The appointments were made this week at a meeting of the executives of the general board and the board of publications.

Rev. Dr. Carson has been editor of The Presbyterian Witness of Halifax for four years, and Rev. Dr. Haddow has held the position of editor of the Presbyterian and Westminster of Toronto for twenty years.

The new official church weekly will be an amalgamation of these two journals, and the dual editorship will have the advantage of combining the best features of papers. Dr. Carson has an intimate knowledge of Eastern Canada; Dr. Haddow knows thoroughly the centre of the religion; while Dr. Solandt, the new business manager, will bring with him a long experience in ministerial and active life in the west.

Dr. Solandt has arrived in Toronto on Wednesday, and will enter upon his duties immediately. Rev. Dr. Carson will leave from Halifax to Toronto at the beginning of December, when the new Presbyterian Witness will be published. Meanwhile, Dr. Haddow continues in the position of acting editor of The Presbyterian and Westminster.

DEMAND FOR COWS AROUSING GERMANS

Doctors Declare Allies' Move Means Death to Thousands of Babies.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—Following the demand for 800,000 milch cows, the allies have now presented a demand upon Germany for 250,000 horses, according to the evening papers. Of these France wants 200,000 and Serbia 50,000.

Medical associations are adopting resolutions of protest, declaring that taking away that many cows means the death sentence for thousands of German babies. Minister of Public Welfare Stegerwald has issued a memorial giving details to show that the loss of that number of cattle would mean decreasing by more than a half million quarts the daily supply for German children and invalids at a time when milk is already so scarce that American quarters have distributed tons of thousands of cans of condensed milk from America.

ROYAL COURTING

Engagement of Charles of Roumania and Helene of Greece Expected.

London, Nov. 20.—Crown Prince Charles of Roumania, who several days ago arrived in Lucca from Bucharest is constantly seen in the company of Princess Helene of Greece, daughter of former King Constantine, says a despatch to the London Times and an announcement of their engagement is expected within a few weeks.

This betrothal if it takes place is regarded as likely to have important effect on the future of the Balkans.

THE SINGLE TAX ISSUE AT SOO

Sault Ste. Marie, Nov. 20.—Labor will again assert itself at the polls in the municipal elections in January. The newly-formed Independent Labor party is now asking the City Council to take a vote of the ratepayers on the question of the introduction of the single tax system in the Sault Ste. Marie, and according to present indications, the issue will be a hotly-contested one. The leaders of the Independent Labor party say they will force the Council to submit the question by securing a petition of at least one-tenth of the ratepayers. Mayor Parquhar is championing the measure in the Council as the Labor party's spokesman, and the probability is he will again run for the Mayorship of 1921, but is certain to have hot opposition.

IRON TRADE SLOWS UP; NO FORWARD BUYING

New York, Nov. 20.—The only pleasant feature in the iron trade, according to the Matthew Addy Company, is the general feeling that the present state of affairs cannot last long. It is asserted that there is no longer whatever forward delivery, purchases consisting of small lots that are wanted in a hurry. Suspension of shipments is being asked in many cases, together with demands for cancellation of orders. Furnaces are said to be resisting cancellations, demanding that contracts be considered as firm obligations. The Addy Company sums up the situation by saying that the iron masters, unable to substantially reduce costs, and unable to sell iron, are meeting the situation by going out of blast.

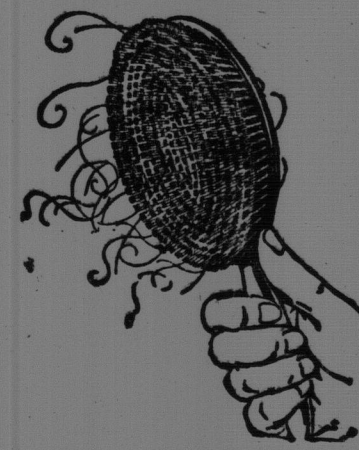
Mrs. Asquith's Much Talked of Book Now Published
