OTTO TITUS IS KILLED IN ACTION

Others From New Brunswick In
The Casualty Lists

The sad news came to Mrs. George W. Titus, of 128 Chesley street, on Sunday that her son, Otto Titus, was officially reported killed in action on August 12. He was thirty-five years of age and went over with the 28th Battalion and recently was transferred to another regiment with which he proceeded to France. He leaves three sisters, Mrs. Richard McGuire, Chesley street; Gladys, at home, and Mrs. Johnston, in the States. Four brothers also survive, Ab, in France recently listed as wounded; George, of Halifax; LeRoy and Ora at home. Mr. Titus, his father, was in Halifax and is expected to arrive in the city today. Much sympathy will be extended to the bereaved ones.

Alderman J. Y. Mersereau of Chatham, was advised yesterday that his son, Lieutenant Charles J. Mersereau, reported missing last week, was now officially reported killed in action. He was twenty-six years old and was serving with the N. B. Battalion.

In Fredericton word of the death of Private Arden Hallett of Millville, formerly employed in the Bank of Nova Scotia, in Fredericton, has been received. Private Hallett crossed with the first contingent.

Thomas O'Dell of Pokiok road, was advised yesterday that his son, Lieutenant Arthur Wesley O'Dell, infantry, was officially reported missing since August 18. He is twenty-nine years old.

Mrs. Mary Hogan, Sand Cove road, has been notified that Gunner Nathaniel McIntyre was seriously ill at Beech Hill Hospital, England. He was a former resident of this city.

Private Judson Mitchell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thaddeus Mitchell, of Campbell, recently gave up his life in France. slingshotting mau'adwyq.

Mrs. Theresa Frame, of Arlington Heights, Mass., has been notified that her son, Peron R. Frame, has been seriously wounded. Private Frame was a native of St. John.

Mr. and Mrs. George Underhill, of Blackville, have been notified that their son, Private Theophilus Underhill, has been killed in action. He was twenty-one years old.

Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Benn, of Douglas-town, were advised on Saturday that their son, Lieutenant F. W. Benn, of the N. B. Battalion, has been missing since August 12.

The names of thirteen New Brunswick men appear in the midweek casualty list. Wounded—J. J. Doucet, Bathurst; G. Murphy, St. John; R. W. Road, Upper Rockport; A. Hill, Chatham; M. D. Williams, Campbellton. Died of wounds—P. M. Allen, Carleton; R. Demerchant, Bath; C. H. Betts, Donkton; W. J. Morrison, St. John; J. E. McIvor, Cain's Mountain. Killed in action—W. D. Brewer, Fredericton. Ill and wounded—C. Hamm, Fredericton.

252 Names in List.

Ottawa, Aug. 26.—In a casualty list issued today appear 1,252 names of Canadian soldiers. Of this number 118 were killed in action, 65 died of wounds, 1 died while prisoner, 29 ill, and 1,008 wounded.

Lieut. Hevenor Coming Home

Camp Sussex, Aug. 26.—Lieutenant G. H. S. Hevenor who proceeded overseas with a draft from the depot battalion on July 1 is being returned to Canada. Official word to this effect was received from the adjutant-general through military channels here. On Lieutenant Hevenor's arrival in England he submitted an application to resign his commission in the C. E. F. and to be enlisted as a private soldier in order to serve in France. His application was accepted but on medical examination he was found to be physically unfit. Consequently he is being returned to Canada and no further action was taken on his application. The military authorities overseas have made it known to all concerned that it is not through any fault of Mr. Hevenor that he is unable to serve in France.

Lieutenant Hevenor's friends in the depot battalion are proud of the fact that he was willing to sacrifice his commission to serve in the firing line.

Thirty-eight men of the depot battalion volunteered today to serve in the Siberian C. E. F.

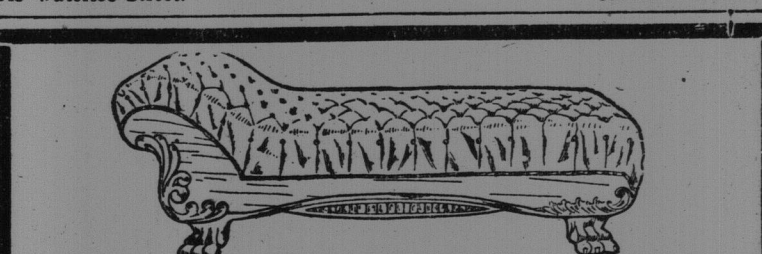

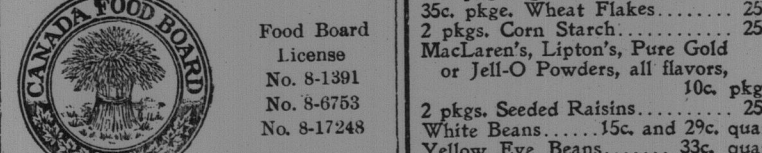
