MASS MEETING HELD

An open-air meeting, under the auspices of the War Lectures Bureau, was held last evening at 6 o'clock in King square at the band stand. Passers by were attracted by the notes of a bugle and in a very short time several hundred people had gathered.

F. A. Dykeman opened the speeches, telling with the question of the purchase of bonds from the standpoint of a business man and citizen. His twenty-minute address was particularly forceful and he was able in that time to touch briefly but effectively upon many of the arguments which spur the business men of the country on to loaning the government money in return for bonds.

Particularly interesting was the address which followed by Sergeant Pink, of West St. John, who dealt with the question of the Victory Loan Campaign from the standpoint of the soldier. He pointed out that it was impossible for the soldier in the front line trenches to "carry on" successfully and efficiently if the arguments which spur the business men of the country on to loaning the government money in return for bonds.

TRIAL ON SHOOTING CHARGE

At Sussex, yesterday, Stipendiary Wilkins began the preliminary hearing against Hugh McDermott, charged with shooting and doing serious bodily harm to George Rogers, a Barnesville boy, on October 15. The case for the crown was looked after by J. M. McIntyre, K. C., Sussex, and the interests of the prisoner were in the hands of R. St. John Freese of Sussex and William M. Ryan, St. John. The court room was crowded throughout the day.

Dr. Henry Hadden, of the General Public Hospital gave evidence. He reviewed at length the serious condition of the wound. George Hutsford of Barnesville, followed. He said that Rogers was employed to assist in threshing in the farm. On the day in question he heard two shots. He then heard the boy shouting and then two more shots. He was in the barn at the time. At 10 o'clock the boy was taken to the hospital. The next morning he went down to the barn and saw a bullet hole in the wall.

William Hutsford also testified. He said that he left the barn and saw McDermott and Benjamin Yarnar both with rifles. He accused them of shooting the boy, but they both denied having fired in the direction of the barn.

The accused was released on bail of \$4,000 and the case will be resumed at 10 o'clock on Saturday next.

Early this morning it was reported at the hospital that the boy's condition was still serious.

SEARCH FOR BODIES

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 28.—Captain J. W. Troup, manager of the C. P. R. coast steamships was informed, in a message from the C. P. R. agent at Juneau, this morning, that a shore patrol had been organized, and Governor Riggs of Alaska was giving every assistance, having taken personal charge of the work of locating the bodies from the Princess Sophia. Over 25 craft are reported to be searching for victims.

Many of the bodies picked up were on life rafts, according to word received here, which indicates that a desperate attempt was made by many to get away from the sinking ship. Those who left the vessel on the rafts doubtless succumbed to exhaustion and exposure.

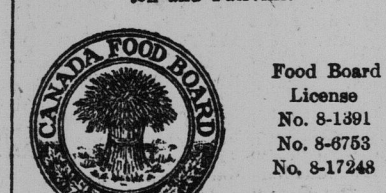
