THE CONTEST IN PRESIDENT WILSON'S STATE

Kingston, N. B., Nov. 5.—Reports received here from Port Au Prince, indicate that the revolution in Haiti for several months, is likely to result in actual fighting next month. The delegates of the government in the north have resigned, and troops have been sent to keep order. There have been clashes between revolutionists and government soldiers in the capital, and it is heard every night in the outskirts of Port Au Prince. President Orestes is surrounded by a heavy guard whenever he appears in public. It is reported that the date of the revolution has been set for the beginning of December, and preparations are ready to be seen. Several refugees have arrived at Kingston.

PROGRESSIVES HOLD BALANCE OF POWER

The republican grip on the legislature was weakened. That party, after a control of years, lacks a majority in each house. The progressives, who scored heavy gains, hold the balance of power. The senate stands—Republicans, 20; Democrats, 18; Progressives, 2. The house stands—Republicans, 17; Democrats, 11; Progressives, 11. The Democrats also made slight gains in the executive council. The outstanding feature of the election, in addition to the manifestly democratic victory, was the strength shown by the Progressives. For the first time since the republicans came in, a party in this state for their nominee for governor was forced into third position. Mr. Bird, leading candidate for governor, was defeated by Charles Sumner Bird, Progressive, by 10,888 votes. Another point of interest was the election of Charles Sumner Bird, Progressive, as an independent. The Fusionists won the majority in almost as large a vote as the Tammany ticket, but they were defeated by a plurality of 28,091. GUTELIUS HAS PROPOSITION SCHEME

Abolish Level Crossings in Railway Town

Overhead Bridges Also Part of Plan—Says it Means Half Million Dollars—Objection to Requirement That City Close Several Streets

(Special to Times) Montreal, Nov. 5.—Plans submitted at a meeting of the Montreal Board of Trade last night by F. P. Gutelius, general manager of the Intercolonial Railway, whereby level crossings in Montreal will be abolished, have attracted much interest locally. The meeting was so well attended that the room was not large enough and the Y. M. C. A. hall was utilized.

The gathering was unique as it was the first time in the history of Montreal that a general manager of the Intercolonial, with his staff of assistants and engineers appeared before the board of trade to discuss crossing and close up streets and lay out overhead bridges in connection with this part of the undertaking. KING TWENTY-SEVEN YEARS YET NEVER AWARE OF THE POSITION HE HELD; MAD OTTO OF BAVARIA IS REPLACED BY LUDWIG

(Canadian Press) Munich, Bavaria, Nov. 5.—King Otto of Bavaria was deposed today from the throne of the kingdom of Bavaria, which he has occupied for twenty-seven years without being aware of his position, and Prince Regent Ludwig proclaimed himself king in his place in pursuance of the provisions of a law just enacted by the Reichstag, and succeeded by his brother, Ludwig II, who dethroned himself in Starnberg Lake on June 18, 1886.

Likely Change in Synod in Reference to Minimum Stipend for Clergymen—Fredericton News

(Special to Times) Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 5.—At the Anglican Synod this morning a committee on the bishop's charge submitted a report which was discussed at some length. A proposal to change the canon in reference to incapacitated clergymen's fund precipitated some discussion. It is proposed to enlarge this fund and make it available for superannuation. There was also some discussion on a proposal to increase the minimum salaries of clergymen by \$100 and a change will likely be made.

GETS \$25,000 BUT OFFER TO SELL GREAT ENGLISH ESTATES TO THE GOVERNMENT

London, Nov. 5.—Following Mr. Lloyd George's land campaign speeches in which he accused the land owners of depopulating immense tracts of land in Scotland, suitable for population and cultivation, to provide deer forests, many land owners are offering to sell large areas to the government at low prices. The Duke of Sutherland, for instance, offers 410,000 acres of which half is a deer forest, and half is arable land. The price he asks varies from \$8.40 to \$20.25 an acre. Another owner offers 100,000 acres at \$10 an acre, while still another offers the entire island of Lewis, comprising 417,000 acres, the price is not given.
