I. C. R. INQUIRY AT MONCTON.

Moncton, N. B., May 15—The proceedings in the Gaskin inquiry before Commissioner G. H. Adair of Sussex were enlivened today by a clash between counsel, C. Lionel Hamilton, for the government, declared that the questions asked I. C. R. Policeman Tingley by J. W. Gaskin's lawyer, James McQueen of Shelburne, were making a farce of the inquiry. Mr. McQueen's rejoinder was that if the inquiry was becoming a farce it was because his learned friend was making it such.

He read from the evidence that a witness, Magee, had said that pencils from the I. C. R. had been hurled by Gaskin in 1906, whereas Detective Steffington had declared he began making the inquiries in 1904 regarding Gaskin after hearing that pencils had been hurled.

Most of the session was taken up in cross-examination of Tingley regarding sales from the I. C. R. to Harvey Gaskin, and sales by him to the Maritime Metal Company of St. John.

LORD MAYOR TO HEAD DELEGATION FROM BRISTOL TO HALIFAX

Tablet to Be Presented on Occasion of Dedication of Memorial Tower

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, May 15.—Bristol is taking great interest in the dedication, by the Duke of Cornwall, of the tower in Halifax to commemorate the birth of British parliamentary government in Nova Scotia. The lord mayor has received an invitation from the mayor of Halifax to associate Bristol with the national memorial.

It was in Nova Scotia that John Cabot landed on his memorable voyage from Bristol in 1497 in the ship "Matthew," under the authority of King Henry VII, for the express purpose of exploring the unknown lands of the western ocean.

Obviously, the Lord Mayor of Bristol says, it is in every way appropriate that Bristol should participate in this function, and that nothing should be left undone to cement the friendship between Bristol and the capital of Nova Scotia. Bristol has accepted the invitation, and a tablet will be presented by its citizens depicting the departure of John Cabot. This will be executed in bronze and placed on one of the internal walls of the memorial. It has also been suggested that the city should send a delegation to present the tablet and a facsimile of the banner and ensign which King Henry VII placed in the hands of John Cabot to enable him to properly carry out his memorable mission.

The lord mayor and lady mayorsess complete heading the delegation to Halifax, which it is hoped will include the Sheriff of Bristol and Mrs. Bush, the master of the Society of Merchant Venturers and Mrs. Skelby, the president of the chamber of commerce and Mrs. Palliser Martin, and Henry Risley and Miss Risley.

HERE TO SEE ABOUT FEDERAL AID TO AGRICULTURE

Ottawa, Ont., May 15—(Special)—C. C. James is going to the maritime provinces next week to see what aid shall be given to agriculture there.

Ottawa, May 15 is usual at this period of the year, the number of labor disputes in existence has increased, in connection with the settlements of wage schedules for the coming season of activity. There were nineteen strikes in April, being five more than in March, and five more than in April, 1911. About fifty firms and 10,000 men were involved. The loss of time is estimated at about 150,000 working days.
