## SIR WILFRID TO RESUME

**ONTARIO MEETINGS TODAY**  
Tampering With C. T. P.—The Homebreds.

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Messrs. Fisher, Graham, Murphy and King, will leave the capital tomorrow afternoon for Cornwall, where the opening meeting of Sir Wilfrid's tour of the older part of the province will be held tomorrow night. Hon. Sydney Fisher has joined the other ex-ministers for this week's series of meetings, and will speak especially on matters of interest to the agriculturists of Canada. Hon. George Graham will have more to say in regard to the really startling disclosures as to the present government's manipulation of the national transcontinental railway and the grade increases and deviations from original plans set of Cochrane now under way. Apparently the government, to serve temporary political ends and private railway interests, is deliberately departing from the real interests of the country and is nullifying the original plan to make the national transcontinental an unrivalled through route for export grain and other commodities between Winnipeg and the seaboard.

It is worthy of note that no official decision as yet have been made by the government to the charges already made by Hon. Messrs. Graham and Murphy. When parliament meets a thorough investigation of these charges will be insisted upon by the opposition and some sensational developments may be expected.

The trade of Canada for the first third of the present fiscal year shows an increase of nearly \$80,000,000, or a little over thirty per cent, as compared with the corresponding four months of last year. The total trade for the first four months of the present fiscal year was \$325,825,846, as compared with \$249,021,739 last year. Imports this year totalled \$210,708,457, an increase of \$47,907,559. Exports totalled \$115,117,389, an increase of \$81,897,599.

Imports for domestic consumption during the four months amounted to \$22,568,564, an increase of \$2,568,564. Domestic exports totalled \$107,268,536, an increase of \$2,568,536. Exports of agricultural products by nearly \$23,000,000, exports of manufactures more than \$2,000,000, and exports of mining products \$4,500,000.

If the present rate of increase is continued for the full twelve months, Canada's trade for the present fiscal year will run well over the billion dollar mark.

Canada's remaining homebred lands in the west have been the youngest and most fertile in regard to their availability and attractiveness for new settlers. The land has been broken up and even more than last year, are taking up in the aggregate much more land by purchase than by homesteading. The most accessible free land districts were taken up by the rush of homesteaders during the past few years.

For the first seven months of this year the number of homestead entries made in the four western provinces has totalled 22,707, a decrease of 1,245 as compared with the first seven months of last year. The total number of homestead entries in Manitoba for the seven months totalled 1,743, an increase of 1,743 as compared with the seven months of last year. In Saskatchewan the total was 1,189, a decrease of 1,189. In Alberta the total this year was 8,574, a decrease of 8,574. In British Columbia the total was 1,189, a decrease of 1,189.

William Strachan, of Harding street, Fairville, was drowned yesterday morning at 11 o'clock while attending to his duties as watchman of the Edward Partington pulp mill.

Most of the workmen engaged in cleaning the boilers of the log pier of the pulp mill had occasion to go to the canal bridge to see the watchman sinking under water. He at once gave the alarm and every effort was made to lasso the body. It is believed Strachan was going along the boom out to a scow when he fell off.

John L. Longstaff, a former English army officer, was killed on Saturday evening at Herbyville, N. Y., and his mechanic was seriously injured when their biplane dropped seventy feet.

The Calhoun Lumber Company's big mill at Laus aux Cousins, near Gaspe, P. Q., and 6,000,000 feet of lumber were destroyed by fire on Saturday. The loss is estimated at \$145,000 and is only partly covered by insurance. The mill will likely be rebuilt. Lieut. Governor Wood is president of the company.

The Cape Breton exhibition at Sydney was closed on Saturday. More than 36,000 people attended.

Sir George Murray has arrived at Ottawa and entered upon his duties in the service of the improvement of the civil service.

J. D. McArthur has been awarded the contract for the construction of the last stretch of the Hudson Bay Railway from Split Lake to Fort Nelson. It is to be completed by 1914.
