RAINBOW WILL MEET EARL GREY

If Trip to Arctic is Carried Out, Cruiser Will Await Him at Mouth of Mackenzie River

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 28.—If the plans for Earl Grey's trip down the Mackenzie River to the Arctic are carried out, His Excellency will be met at the mouth of the Mackenzie by the cruiser Rainbow of the Canadian navy, now stationed at the Pacific coast as a training ship. It is proposed that Earl Grey shall make his start from Edmonton in the early morning. As the date of the trip to Hudson Bay, His Excellency will be escorted by a detachment of Northwest Mounted Police.

It is estimated that it will take not more than three weeks to make the journey down the Mackenzie River. The journey by sea on the Rainbow from the mouth of the Mackenzie to Victoria will be a 6,000 miles. Special precautions will be taken as to navigation.
