ILLUMINATING GAS DISCOVERED IN HUNT FOR ELK OF GOLD

"Wild Spirit" Revealed by Chance in Seventeenth Century Hunt for Elk of Gold. The discovery and utilization of gas marked the most important step in the progress of modern illumination, according to the Illinois Committee on Public Utility. Although gas was discovered about the middle of the seventeenth century it was not until the later years of the eighteenth century and the beginning of the nineteenth century that man learned how to make it serve a useful purpose, members of the committee stated. Gas was the first public utility. Later came electricity, the telephone and the electric railway. Man's eternal search for riches and the futile endeavors of alchemists to change the base metals into gold led to the accidental discovery of artificial gas. John Baptist Van Helmont, of Brussels, studied and practiced medicine and later turned to chemistry and research work. In the course of his experiments with fuels in 1669 he discovered that they yielded what he described as "wild spirit." He found that "this spirit" could be produced by means of combustion, fermentation and the action of acids on lime. So phantasmic and elusive was Van Helmont's discovery that he named it for spirit. It was nearly 600 years after Van Helmont's discovery that practical steps were taken to harness this elusive spirit. Natural gas was found several years later in England, one of the first descriptions of this being that of Thomas Shirley, in which he mentions that his attention was directed to what was considered to be a spring "where the water did burn like oil" and "did boil and heave like water in a pot." On investigation he found that "a spirit" which ignited on the approach of a lighted candle and "did burn bright and vigorous." Dr. John Clayton, a Yorkshire minister with a predilection for sciences, robbed the spirit of some of its elusive qualities by experiments between 1660 and 1670. Heating "ethylic oil" in a closed vessel he found that a "spirit" which issued out caught fire at the flame of a candle. He amused his William Murdoch, in 1792, by distilling the gas in an iron retort and conducting the gas through seventy feet of tin and copper tubes, succeeded in lighting his home at Redruth in Cornwall. Later he built an apparatus on a larger scale and lighted the factory of James Watt, developer of the steam engine, for whom he was a consultant and erection engineer. On May 18, 1804, Frederick Albert Winsor, a German, obtained the first English patent for gas-making. The first public street light with gas took place in Pall Mall, London, January 28, 1807. In April, 1812, Parliament granted a charter to this company, "The London and Westminster Gas, Light and Coke Company" and thus the first gas company in the world came into being. Mrs. C. F. MISARRIAGE OF JUSTICE.

(London Express) The conviction of Sir Almeric FitzRoy for "obscurely interfering with and annoying persons in Hyde Park," was summarily quashed at the London Sessions yesterday. This collapses another of the amateur decisions of Mr. Mead, the clerk of the court of the Sessions. An archdeacon, a banker, and a curate have all recently been convicted of Hyde Park offences by Mr. Mead on evidence so flimsy that the Sessions Court promptly quashed the convictions. Now there is the case of Sir Almeric FitzRoy. What does the Home Secretary think about it? What does he propose to do? Sir Almeric FitzRoy has already resigned his post as Clerk of the Privy Council. Immediately at the close of his case yesterday he was taken to the Privy Council office, where he was heartily welcomed, and where he at once dealt with arrears of work which had accumulated during his absence. "I feel sincerely grateful to the newspapers for the fair and impartial manner in which they have dealt with my case," he said. "My experience has shown me that a perfectly innocent person may unwittingly find himself in a very serious position." When Sir Almeric FitzRoy entered the court yesterday morning he showed how acutely he realized that he was fighting for his good name. He hallowed eyes told of sleepless nights. Sudden nervous movements of his hands and the inability to remain still proved that his nerves were on edge. Lady FitzRoy accompanied her husband to this seat at the solicitors' table, whispered a few words to him, and passed to a seat in the body of the court. Sir Almeric who was dressed in a dark coat, a brown waistcoat, and striped trousers, laid a black felt and a pair of kid gloves among the legal papers before him, and composed himself to follow the progress of his appeal against one of the most remarkable miscarriages of justice of recent times.
