Grand Falls Boy Scouts Won
Junior Wallace Nesbit

Sunrise Troop of East Saint John
Fifth—Others From This
City in List.

The 1st Grand Falls troop of Boy Scouts has won the Junior Wallace Nesbit first aid competition of the St. John Ambulance Association in New Brunswick, wrestling that honor from the 2nd Rothesay Company of Girl Guides, the winners of last year. The Grand Falls Scout team has been a close second both last year and the previous year and deserve great credit for the good showing that it has always made since it is a solitary team which has not had some of the opportunities for training that are available in larger centres. The team was trained by the scoutmaster, Stanley Chapman, and it made a total of 280 marks. The members of the team are Joe McCann, captain; Billy Chapman, Byron Lyman and Donald Wylie. Miss K. Stewart, of Fredericton, conducted the examinations and the team tests, she said, were specially hard, being the case of a fractured thigh, compound, with hemorrhage and a simple fracture of both bones of the left arm.

JOHN J. WEDDALL IS DEAD AT CAPITAL

Prominent Business Man Succumbs After Short Illness From Pneumonia.

FREDERICTON, June 1.—John J. Weddall, aged 79, head of the dry goods firm of John Weddall & Son, and one of the oldest active business men in Fredericton, died at his home this afternoon from pneumonia. He was one of the leading laymen of the Methodist church in New Brunswick, and had been ill only a few days.

The late Mr. Weddall was a native of Pictou, N. S., where he was born on July 6, 1846, a son of the late Rev. R. Weddall, but the greater part of his long and useful life was spent in Fredericton, where he had lived since he was 18 years of age.

PURCHASED BUSINESS.
After acquiring a knowledge of the dry goods trade he purchased, in 1881, the business of the late Thomas Logan and carried it on with great success. His only son, Charles H. Weddall, was admitted to partnership several years ago and since that time has been known as John J. Weddall & Son. While his own business made large demands upon his time, the late Mr. Weddall took a keen and practical interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the city. He was a charter member of the Board of Trade and had filled the presidential office. He served for a number of years in the city council, and was also a member of the Board of School Trustees.

PROMINENT IN CHURCH.
He had long been an outstanding figure in the Methodist church of Fredericton, and will be greatly missed by his late associates in that denomination. He served as recording steward for 44 years, was superintendent of the Sabbath school and had frequently been a delegate to the Methodist conference. His death will be a distinct loss to Methodists in the Maritime Provinces.

Mr. Weddall was in his eightieth year and is survived by one son, Charles H. Weddall, and one daughter, Miss Daisy Weddall, both of this city; also one brother, Rev. Dr. Weddall, also of this city. His wife, who was a daughter of the late George Hatt, pre-deceased him several years ago.

The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the home at 12 York street. Rev. F. H. Holmes will conduct the services and interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.
