

CITY VOTERS' LIST IS LARGER

Shows Increase of 3,044 Over That Filed Year Ago

Pre-election Figures Are Cut 1,211—May be Application to Change Law

John was filed yesterday afternoon with the common clerk by the revisors. It shows an increase of 3,044 over the list filed last year and a decrease of 1,211 from the list as it was amended and added to before the provincial election last fall. The list filed last year contained 24,273 names and there were added before the election 4,203 names, bringing the total for 1924 up to 28,476.

The list filed yesterday, after duplications, names of those who had died or moved, had been deducted, contains the names of 27,237 qualified voters.

MAY CHANGE LAW
The manner of making the voters' list has been given attention by Commissioner Frink, one of the revisors for this year, and it is likely that legislation will be sought at the next session of the legislature making a change in the law and providing for a register to whom all voters will have to come and register their names.

CHINESE GENERAL IS SHOT AND KILLED

Assassin, Son of General Lu, Who Admits Act in Revenge of Father's Death

PERING, Dec. 30.—General Hsu Shu Chang, popularly known as "Little Han," was shot and killed on the railroad station platform at Langfang last night.

The assassin, self-proclaimed in a country-wide manifesto, was Lu Cheng Wu, a captain in the National People's Army, and son of General Lu Chien Chang, whom Hsu shot in Lu's garden at Tientsin, while Hsu was on his way to the city. Captain Lu, who apparently has not been arrested, declared his act was in revenge for his father's murder. Lu is a cousin of Marshal Feng Yu Hsiang, formerly styled "the Christian General," who commands the National People's forces which recently occupied Tientsin.

TITLED RUM RUNNER OWES \$1,250,000
Bankruptcy of Sir Broderick Hartwell Laid to Bootleggers and Revenue Men

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The lot of the get-rich-quick rum-runner is a difficult one between the American blockade and the American bootleggers. This was revealed today in the course of the bankruptcy receiver hearing in the case of Sir Broderick Hartwell, who conceived a lucrative scheme for rum-running to the States, only to find that it left him financially embarrassed.

Sir Broderick's liabilities were placed at about \$1,250,000, and the receiver was told that the bankruptcy was due to the fact of "leakage of liquor by the United States and failure of the buyers (road bootleggers) to pay."
