



(Toronto Globe) Canada requires for consumption pur-

oses approximately 40,000,000 bushels of wheat, and for seeding purposes about 35,000,000, making a total of 75,000,000 bushels, according to authorities on this subject. The government's estimate on this subject. The government's estimate that the Dominion yield runs about 193,000,-000 bushels makes it appear possible for Canada to export about 113,000,000 bushels in 1919-20, as compared with 105,-611,000 in the last 12 months. Of course the export trade depends largely upon vessel and loan accommodation. The bottoms are not so scarce now as two or three months ago, but space is even yet at a premium. Some of the European buyers require loans in order to place them in a position to participate in the purchase of Canadian products. If this financing can be satisfactorily arranged Canada's expartation of wheat will prob-ably exceed that of last year by about 10.000.000 husbels 10.000.000 bushels.

Ottawa's Version of Situation

The Globe's Ottawa correspondent, after consulting with the Agricultural Department and various others, sums up

the situation as follows: "Although the Canadian wheat crop is now estimated at only 105,000,000 Is now estimated at only 105,000,000 bushels, the problem of Canada in get-ting this to the various markets of the world is not changed in essence. It must not be forgotten that last year the Can-adian production was only 189,075,000 bushels, and that it exported 103,611,000 bushels. This year again, therefore, there will be just as great a demand for shipping to carry the wheat to the Euhipping to carry the wheat to the Eu-opean markets as there was last year, and even greater, because it is believed that this year the demand from Europe will be so great that our carry-over stock on August 1, 1920 will not exceed a few

"The United States and Canada to-ether will have more than four hundred lion bushels for export. Europe will need more than twice that amount, and countries like Great Britain, France, Belgium, Italy and the neutral northern countries can take up more than North America's surplus. Germany will need eighty-five million bushels and Austria-Jungary and Czecho-Slovakia fifty mil-ion bushels. Some of this will be ob-ained from the United States, and Roumania is already exporting wheat from its seventy million bushel crop. Russia in Europe is supposed to have half a bil-lion bushels of wheat in the new crop and Russia in Asia another one hundred million bushels. illion bushels. This is far below the pre-war average, and it can be absorbed easily outside of the good cash custom-ers in the neutral nations and the allies eferred to.

European Production Down

"The whole European production is nearly half a billion bushels down below what it was in the five years preceding the war. North America exceeds its pre-war production by about 230,000,000 bushels. South America is twelve mil-lions ahead; Australia stationary, and Asia one hundred millions less. Canad-ian wheat is, cherefore, an absolute necessity in world commerce during the com-"If credits and shipping can be satis-

factorily arranged it is expected here that the United States and Canada will practically sell out everything leaving the world's carry-over stock in the hands of the Argentine and Australia. Great Britain, France and Belgium are the countries needing credits, and Canada will undoubtedly need at least two hun-dred million dollars for that purpose. Great Britain and Ireland will need at least 180,000,000 bushels, nearly seventy millions more than Canada has to export. The cash-paying nations need about forty-eight million bushels."
