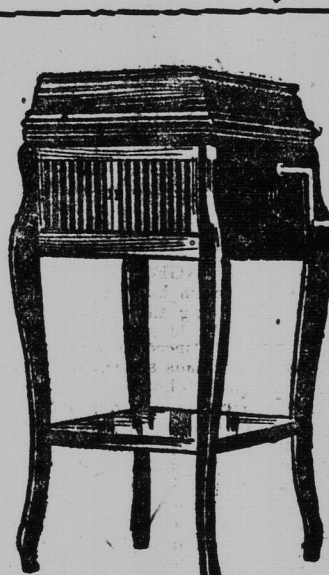

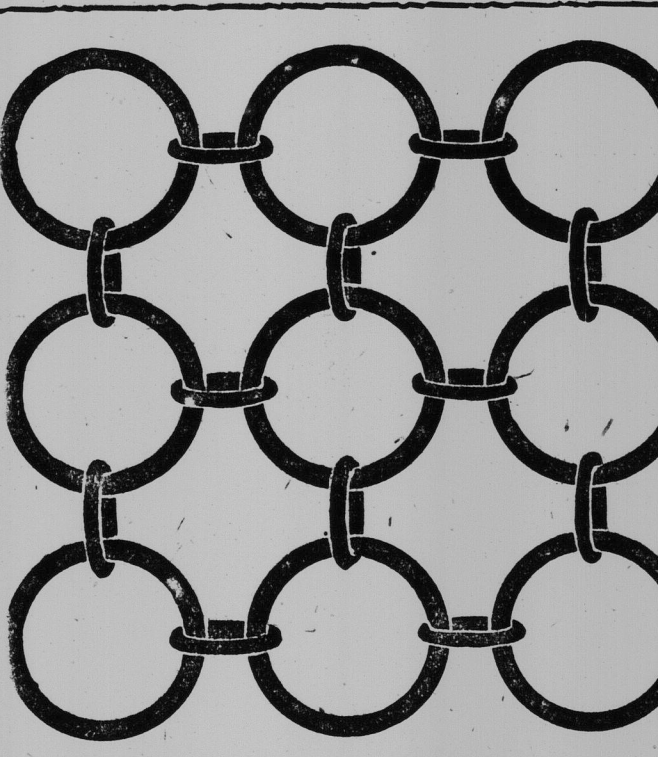

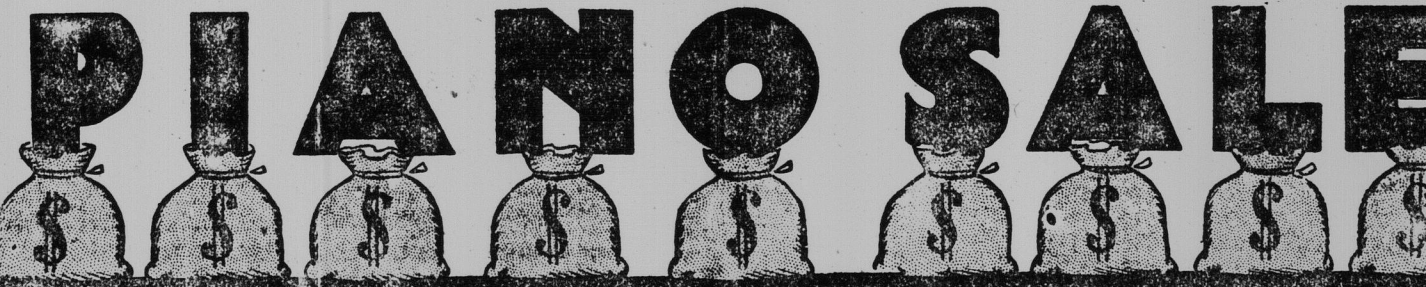

WILL EXPORT MORE THAN LAST YEAR

(Toronto Globe)

Canada requires for consumption purposes approximately 40,000,000 bushels of wheat, and for seedling purposes about 35,000,000, making a total of 75,000,000 bushels, according to authorities on this subject. The government's estimate that the Dominion yield runs about 183,000,000 bushels makes it appear possible for Canada to export about 118,000,000 bushels in 1919-20, as compared with 105,615,000 in the last 12 months. Of course the export trade depends largely upon vessel and loan accommodation. The bottoms are not so scarce now as two or three months ago, but space is even yet at a premium. Some of the European buyers require loans in order to place them in a position to participate in the purchase of Canadian products. If this financing can be satisfactorily arranged Canada's exportation of wheat will probably exceed that of last year by about 10,000,000 bushels.

Ottawa's Version of Situation

The Globe's Ottawa correspondent, after consulting with the Agricultural Department and various others, sums up the situation as follows:

"Although the Canadian wheat crop is now estimated at only 108,000,000 bushels, the problem of Canada in getting this to the various markets of the world is not changed in essence. It must not be forgotten that last year the Canadian production was only 189,075,000 bushels, and that it exported 104,611,000 bushels. This year again, therefore, there will be just as great a demand for shipping to carry the wheat to the European markets as there was last year, and even greater, because it is believed that this year the demand from Europe will be so great that our carry-over stock on August 1, 1920 will not exceed a few million bushels.

"The United States and Canada together will have more than four hundred million bushels for export. Europe will need more than twice that amount, and countries like Great Britain, France, Belgium, Italy and the neutral northern countries can take up more than North America's surplus. Germany will need eighty-five million bushels and Austria-Hungary and Czechoslovakia fifty million bushels. Some of this will be obtained from the United States, and Roumania is already exporting wheat from its seventy million bushel crop. Russia in Europe is supposed to have half a billion bushels of wheat in the new crop and Russia in Asia another one hundred million bushels. This is far below the pre-war average, and it can be absorbed easily outside of the pool cash customers in the neutral nations and the allies referred to.

European Production Down

The whole European production is nearly half a billion bushels down below what it was in the five years preceding the war. North America exceeds its pre-war production by about 250,000,000 bushels. South America is twelve millions ahead; Australia stationary, and Asia one hundred millions less. Canadian wheat is, therefore, an absolute necessity in world commerce during the coming year.

"If credits and shipping can be satisfactorily arranged it is expected here that the United States and Canada will practically sell out everything leaving the world's carry-over stock in the hands of the Argentine and Australia. Great Britain, France and Belgium are the countries needing credits, and Canada will undoubtedly need at least two hundred million dollars for that purpose. Great Britain and Ireland will need at least 150,000,000 bushels, nearly seventy millions more than Canada has to export. The cash-paying nations need about forty-eight million bushels."

KAISER FILM SEIZED

Copenhagen, Oct. 30.—A competent German court has acceded to the former German emperor's application for the seizure and confiscation of the "Kaiser film," according to the Zeitung am Mittag. The action against the actor, Ferdinand Bonn, who prepared the film, has been abandoned.

Suit was instituted against Bonn by the former Emperor recently, in suit and the misuse of his portrait being charged. The film was to have been produced in Berlin October 10, but was suppressed by the government. It was exhibited elsewhere, however.

GERMANY'S BIG DEBT. Berlin, Oct. 29.—(Associated Press.)—The gravity of the financial condition of the nation was frankly admitted by the government in a public session of the National Council.

Government representatives stated that the national debt was already 172,000,000,000 marks, and that it would rise to 201,000,000,000 marks by April 1, 1920, after all credits under the budget had been realized upon. Germany's pre-war debt amounted to 5,000,000,000 marks.

A government representative declared that it would cost Germany as much to wind up the war as it did to conduct the four years' hostilities.
