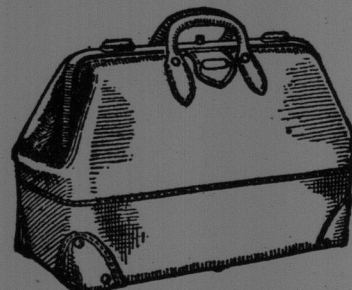

The Navy League committee in charge last night consisted of R. F. Armstrong, president; Captain A. J. Mulcahy, vice-president; C. B. Allan, secretary treasurer and Walter Brindle, manager of the Seamen's Institute.

Mrs. Edwards was assisted by the heads of the women's organizations in the city. Mrs. E. A. Young was convenor for the girls from West St. John, Mrs. J. Boyle Travers for the girls from Lancaster and Mrs. H. B. Peck for the girls of East St. John. Among the women's societies which co-operated and whose heads were present were the Women's Canadian Club, the Women's Council, Catholic Women's League, Girls Association of St. John, St. David's Old Country Club, Young Women's Christian Association, the primary chapters of the Empire, the Young Women's Hebrew Association, and many more.

Refreshments were served by the Navy League with a lavish hand.

There were about 300 of the men from the warships including Captain Adams and most of the officers and about 400 of the girls from the city and their chaperones. The men declared that they had never been so royally entertained in any Canadian city before.

### LOOKING INTO MATTER

Commissioner T. H. Bullock announced yesterday that he was examining the tripartite agreement with a view to ascertaining if the government could not be called upon to furnish facilities for the loading of cattle at this port. He also has entered into communication with A. D. MacTier, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in regard to this matter. A prominent cattle shipper said that on the resumption of the cattle trade with Great Britain the port of St. John could not be used on account of the lack of stock yards and other facilities for the shipping of cattle. It is with the intention of having these matters rectified that Mr. Bullock is looking into the subject.

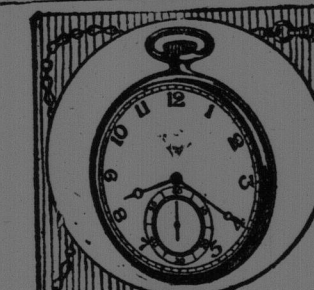
