

At first this ephemeral College occupied the Home District School House, and one of its first acts was to turn from the doors of their old grammar school eight poor boys who had before been receiving free tuition. Furthurmore tle boys of the old District School were required to pay for their mition as many pounds annually as they had formerly paid crowns. 




