WOMAN DRIVES MOTOR CAR IN CROWDED LONDON STREETS

Miss Dorothy Levitt, Who Has Broken Many Records, Demonstrates the Ability of Women to Act as Chauffeurs.

LONDON, March 4.—In view of the fact that two of the women who applied for cabmen's licenses in Paris obtained them, Miss Levitt, the famous lady motorist, who broke so many records at Blackpool, drove a motor car throughout the streets of London yesterday in order to test the ability of women for positions as chauffeurs. She gives the following account of her experience:

"When I was asked to drive a motor car round London to test the possibilities of motor-car driving as a calling for women, I must confess that I did not very much like the idea. 'It is one thing to drive a racing motor car at a high speed along a specially constructed track, and if one meets success, to be applauded by the spectators; but it is a very different matter to crawl on an unaccustomed vehicle through the streets of London, risking a fearful amount of chaff of possibly an unpleasant nature.'

"However, after I had thought the matter over for a little, the possibilities seemed considerable, and I decided to go through the ordeal—and it was certainly no light one.

"I drove out of the garage along a line of amused spectators, and I was along for a little over a badly made road. When I got into Kennington Road, however, it was better, and I let the machine go at a good speed. The tram lines were a little annoying, and the tires of the car got slightly jammed.

WELSH HERBALISTS EFFECT SOME MARVELOUS CURES

Patients Crowd the Little Town Where Two Modest and Unlettered Peasants Treat Many Diseases With Quaint Methods.

CARDIFF, March 4.—In the last few days, since accounts of alleged marvelous cures effected by the herbalists, J. and D. Evans, of Cardigan, have appeared in the newspapers, patients have been arriving in the town by every train.

Among the patients beginning treatment this week are some with cancer of the breast and necrosis of the chief bone of the leg. Telegrams and letters are pouring in at the Evans surgery, and the reading and answering of these appears to be a greater task to the herbalists than the mere curing of the diseases.

In all cases the method of treatment is the same. A liquid or ointment made entirely from herbs, and said to contain no mineral, caustic whatever, is painted over the part, and then fresh green leaves, bruised by rolling them out on a table, with a bottle as a roll-out, are applied all over the part, and a bandage is put on. The treatment is often quite painful, though the Evanses say that by taking more time they could get equally good results painlessly.

They say their chief difficulty is with cancer that has been operated on. These cases they liken to trees cut away from their roots, and the main bulk of the growth being gone, they have nothing into which their remedy may draw the roots. They pass directly from case to case, treating patients with widely different maladies without the precaution of disinfecting their hands.

A twig of wood pointed at one end is used throughout the day as a probe to pick off the leaves applied the day before. Their remedy is painted on the diseased surface with a camel-hair brush or a feather. Everything is done on a most primitive and unsanitary scale; yet no case of blood poisoning or spreading of infection are known in the town.

Yesterday, leaving their farm early in the morning, they tramped all day through the rain, visiting their patients, with no time for a midday meal. They reached home between 2 and 3 a. m. to find about sixty letters and telegrams awaiting them. To letters begging for treatment the inevitable answer is that "if the writers will come to Cardigan the Evanses, with God's grace, will do their best to cure them." They seem dismayed at nothing. MAKES RECORD TRIP

LIVERPOOL, Mar. 2.—The Canadian Pacific Royal Mail steamship, Empress of Ireland, which sailed from Halifax last Sunday morning at 1.15, arrived at the Bar Light at Liverpool, at 7 a. m. Allowing four hours for difference in time, she made the run from Halifax to Liverpool, in six days, one hour, and forty-five minutes, or just three hours and fifteen minutes faster than her sister ship, the Empress of Britain on her last trip.
