WIFE WILLING WITNESS AGAINST HER HUSBAND

Case of John Allan, Charged With Obtaining Money Under False Pretences, Goes to Jury This Morning--Numerous Witnesses Testify Giving Money to Prisoner.

The case of the King vs. John W. Allen, charged with obtaining money and goods under false pretences from four citizens, was commenced in the circuit court yesterday afternoon before His Honor Justice Barry and the following jury: Wm. B. Hatfield, Daniel Monahan, Chas. E. Harding, John Ross, Alfred Crowley, John R. Greer, Thomas J. Barnes, Charles M. Langley, Jas. S. Dalzell, Manzer E. Grass, John S. Seaton and James F. McDonald.

When the court arose at six o'clock last evening both counsel had addressed the jury and adjournment was made until this morning at 10 o'clock when the trial resumed.

Attorney General Hazen appeared for the Crown and E. C. Weyman for the accused. Separate Trial Asked.

On behalf of the prisoner, Mr. Weyman moved that the counts in the indictment be tried separately.

The attorney general consented to enter a nolle prosequi in respect to the fourth count in the indictment, in which Mr. R. Amos was charged the accused with obtaining a sum of money representing that he was going to join the ship laborers' society.

Mr. Weyman then asked to have the last count in the indictment tried separately. In this count the accused was charged with obtaining a sum of money under false pretences.

The attorney general said that he felt disposed to grant his learned friend's request, but thought that it was a needless expense.

Mr. Weyman also moved to have the second count tried separately. This was opposed by the attorney general.

His honor refused to allow a separate trial in regard to the second count, but allowed a separate trial on the seventh count.

The first count charged the prisoner with obtaining a railway ticket to Fredericton from A. M. Belding under false pretences.

The second count charged the prisoner with obtaining money from Thomas R. Christian under false pretences.

The third count charged the accused with obtaining money from W. Anderson under false pretences.

The fifth count charged Allen with fraudulently obtaining money from Henry P. Puddington.

The prisoner, on being arraigned, pleaded not guilty to all the counts. Mr. Hazen challenged him, and he was released.

MADERO ASSUMES PRESIDENCY TITLE

Continued From Page One. "I have assumed the character of provisional president of the United States of Mexico with the power and requisite faculties of making war upon the usurpatory government of Gen. Diaz," the document states, "as soon as the capital of the republic and more than one-half of the states of the federation shall be in the power of the forces of the people, the provisional president will convocate to extraordinary general elections to be held one month later and he shall turn over his powers to the president-elect."

On the 29th of Nov. from 6 o'clock p. m. on all the citizens of the republic will take up arms to thrust from power the authorities governing it now. Attention is also called of every Mexican of the duty to respect persons as well as property of foreigners. One of the first acts of the provisional government shall be to set at liberty all political prisoners.

All military authorities shall dispose of all munitions found in the public offices in order to provide for the ordinary expenses of the administration and for the cost of war, keeping aside with the greatest scrupulousity. When such funds are not sufficient for military outlays, voluntary or forced loans shall be resorted to, but not to be levied on citizens or from national institutions.

Reys Not in It. Paris, Nov. 24.—General Bernardo Reyes, the Mexican soldier, who came to Paris some time ago on a military mission for the Mexican government, denied today the report that he intends to return to Mexico to take part in the revolution. To a representative of the Associated Press, General Reyes expressed the opinion that President Diaz whom he described as a great patriot, would succeed in restoring order and afterward adopt effective measures to allay the present popular discontent in Mexico. General Reyes declared to go into details regarding the causes which led up to the present condition of affairs in his country, but expressed the belief that the unrest could not be considered as serious and would not last long.

Of Francisco Madero, leader of the revolutionists in Mexico, General Reyes said, "Madero lacks experience. He has had no public career which would make him formidable. Should some man with greater prestige and a popular following and especially a man of influence with the army appear behind him, the situation might possibly become grave."

Laredo, Nov. 24.—Mexican consul Miguel E. Diebold, who has headquarters in this city, received official advices today which say that quiet has been restored at all points save one throughout the country.

The exception cited is what is known as the Guerrero district in the State of Chihuahua. In that section 200 revolutionists are still making attacks on small villages. The consul asserts they are not "revolutionists," but bandits who are using the uprising as a pretext to rob and pillage.

The Mexican government still maintains a cordon of troops along the border. On the American side of the river troops are on guard from Brownsville to Del Rio, and according to information this stretch of territory has been quiet all day.
