

# ALL THE NEWS OF ST. JOHN CITY AND VICINITY

## RAPID GROWTH IN NUMBER OF NEW SETTLERS

During First Quarter of Present Year 573 Immigrants Arrived and were Looked After by Agent Mantle.

Immigrants have been coming into the province at a rapid rate this winter according to a report submitted to the Board of Trade yesterday by Thomas Mantle, the immigration agent on the West Side. Last week a total of 134 people entered the province, making 326 for the month of March. The total number of immigrants coming to the province for the first quarter of the year who were looked after by Mr. Mantle, he gives as 573, which shows a remarkable increase over the corresponding period of last year.

## IN THE COURTS

**Supreme Court.**  
In the case of Judge P. A. Landry vs. The New Brunswick Alberta Land Company, Limited, with head office in Dorchester, N. B., hearing was had yesterday morning before Mr. Justice McKeown on the motion of M. G. Teed, K. C., for the plaintiff to continue an injunction restraining the defendants from selling certain shares of their capital stock which the plaintiff says he is entitled to. It was contended that the plaintiff had secured an option on sixty-seven shares of stock and the injunction was to restrain the company from allotting or disposing of these shares in any way; also to restrain them from declining any dividend on their stock except on the basis of the sixty-seven shares claimed being considered the same as the rest of the stock issued by dividends on the said stock being provided for in the treasury. James Friel of Dorchester opposed the motion and affidavits were read on both sides. His Honor ordered that the injunction be continued.

**County Court Chambers.**  
Judge Forbes gave judgment for the plaintiff yesterday morning in the case of Steeves vs. Lynch. This case was partly tried a few days ago and the attorneys agreed upon a settlement whereby the plaintiff was to receive \$185 in settlement of the claim. This amount was to be paid within a given period. The time having expired and the amount not being paid, judgment was entered for the full amount of the claim, \$217, and costs. G. H. V. Belyea was the plaintiff's solicitor and J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., was solicitor for the defendant.

**Probate.**  
In the probate court yesterday in the matter of the estate of Mrs. Elizabeth H. Macaulay, there was return of a citation to pass the accounts of Alexander H. Law, the administrator, and for order for distribution. The accounts were proved as filed, but it appeared that there was insufficient to meet the claims of the creditors, and was therefore ordered to be divided among those who have proved their claims. Mrs. Scott's kindly disposition won her many friends and although living to such an advanced age her faculties were unimpaired to the last. Those surviving her of her family of nine are, Mrs. J. A. Beatty and Mrs. Keith residing in Hillsborough; Mrs. Alex. Crosby of Calais, Mrs. Kimball of Philadelphia, Howard Scott of Moncton who died a few years ago was a son. The funeral will be held from the First Hillsborough Baptist church on Friday, the Rev. I. A. Campbell conducting the service. Interment will be at Greys Island.

## NEW BRIDGE AT FALLS TO BE COMMENCED SOON

Work to Start May 1st and Rushed to Completion—To Improve Equity Court Rooms—Other Items.

Hon. John Morrissey, Minister of Public Works; Hon. John E. Wilson, and H. Blair, secretary of the public works department, yesterday paid a visit to the Equity Court room and after inspecting the fittings decided on immediate improvements: Hon. Mr. Morrissey also confirmed the appointment of Edward Burns as government appraiser to adjust the damage to be paid to the Burns estate for its property at the Falls, which will be taken by the government for the approach to the new bridge.

The work of erecting the piers and preparing the approaches for the new bridge at the Falls will be commenced the first of May. The work when started will be hurried forward rapidly.
