This investigation shows that the first effect of the war was practically the same throughout Europe. At first there was a sharp rise in prices, due to panic and uncertainty. Then the prices dropped, only to rise again. The upward turn is said to be con-tinuing and it is feared that the climax is not yet reached. Here in part is a summary of the situation as announced by the Bureau of Labor Statistics: "The price figures available are somewhat incomplete, but almost

Potatoes was one of the few articles which showed a fall in prices in most of the more impor-tant countries. Meat also was another increased but little in price. "Flour, on the other hand, showed decided changes. "Russia is the greatest wheat er-practically shut off its foreign mar-kets. It is not surprising, therefore, to find that the price of wheat flour had actually fallen in Moscow. 
