## LETTERS PATENT TO SEVERAL COMPANIES

Fredericton, Aug. 18.—Supplementary letters patent have been issued whereby the name of the Josiah Fowler Company, Ltd., has been changed to Campbell & Fowler, Ltd., and the capital stock increased from \$50,000 to \$99,900, and to pay in shares of the new company the sum of \$39,900 to the persons entitled for the business property and assets of W.
