



## Two Sea Captains Get Promotions

Furness, Withy & Company have given out interesting announcements affecting two well known captains whose friends will extend congratulations to them. Captain F. W. Chambers, D. S. C., of the steamer Digby, has been made commodore of the Furness Line fleet, and Captain Paolo has been promoted to commodore of the fleet operated by Manchester Line, Limited, both being Furness corporations.

Captain Chambers is now on his way to Boston from Halifax with the Digby, and Captain Paolo is about due at Manchester with the Manchester Brigade, of which he is master. Captain Chambers has been forty years in the Furness Line employ. In addition to the honor conferred on Captain Paolo he has been given command of the crack new steamer Manchester Regiment, 1,600 tons, and launched on the River Tees in September last, and now about completed at West Hartlepool. The new ship is the very latest type of freighter, being a turbine and an oil burner.

## Sweden Asked To Declare War On Troublesome Rats

Stockholm, March 16.—Sweden has been asked to declare war on extermination on rats and mice. The military behind this project are the members of the Medical Board of Sweden.

The board has submitted to the government a memorandum proposing that a war be introduced in the present. Rats and mice are the most effective means of killing rodents.

It is proposed to impose compulsory obligation on towns, villages, municipalities and rural communities to take steps for the killing of rats and mice and that the law extend to all ships and ship owners. A state appropriation is asked to cover the cost of exterminating the most effective means of killing rodents.

It is further proposed by the Medical Board that the government should require that new buildings shall be made rat and mice proof or at least difficult of access to those parts and that old buildings be required to meet this requirement.

## Soviet Shies At Genoa Conference

Doubt Increases That Russians Will Attend Economic Conference.

London, March 16.—Although official acceptance by the Italian Government of the date fixed at Bologna April 10, was hailed by some British officials as a sure indication that the German programme for an economic union that to submit themselves to the vague prospects of Genoa. This information was given your correspondent by a man just returned from Moscow, and it is his definite opinion that there is no certainty yet as to which course Russia will follow, but that as far as he has been able to see, the Germans are working extremely hard to convince the Soviet authorities that the best policy would be to work with them and not with the world in general.

Mexico City, March 16.—Plans for the concentration in Mexico City of the branch of one of the largest American mail order houses have been abandoned temporarily because of the lack of recognition by the United States of the Mexican government, says an announcement by the local representative of the company.

## GERMAN WANTED TO JOIN LEGION

Mexico City, Mar. 16.—A man who spoke English with an accent recently called at headquarters of the American Legion here and made his desire to join.

Commander Louis Lech asked for his army discharge papers but when he brought them, the next day, they identified him as one of the bravest soldiers who ever received an Iron Cross from a grateful Kaiser.

The German explained that he thought the Legion was an organization of old soldiers, no matter where they fought.

New York, March 16.—The raw sugar market opened firmer with spot prices 1.14 higher while April shipment was unchanged at 2 1/2 cents and freight, equal to 5.00 for contract. There were sales of 70,000 bags of Cuban for March and April shipment.
