TERRIBLE BOILER EXPLOSION.

One Man Killed and Two Others Fatally Injured.

Toronto, Jan. 21.—The Knickerbocker Ice Company's works, owned by A. D. Chas. Burns, was the scene of a terrible boiler explosion this afternoon, resulting in the death of one man and fatal injuries to two others, besides minor injuries to half a dozen more. Andrew W. Evey was the engineer in charge of the small portable engine used for hoisting blocks of ice from the storage house to the street. The explosion occurred at the storage house and was heard across the room when the boiler exploded and died on the way to the hospital. Richard McGregor and Frank Carr, employees were badly scalded and otherwise injured. A report from the hospital late tonight, says both are likely to die before morning. The cause of the explosion is uncertain, but it is thought the water in the boiler ran too low and Evey turning in more caused a sudden generation of steam. The engine room was badly wrecked and the dying debris was hurled 200 yards away.

NEW TYPE OF PORTLAND

Big Propeller Steamer to Take Place of Lost Side-Wheeler.

Boston, Jan. 21.—The Portland Steamship Company is already figuring upon a new boat to take the place of the Portland, which will be a thoroughly staunch ocean-going vessel of the propeller type, thus doing away with the overhauling guards and giving the sea no leverage beneath the tip sides in the event of rough weather. An order has been placed with the John Roach & Sons Building Company for a steel steamship, to have twin screws, with the latest modern engines. She is to be 320 feet over all, with a beam of 50 feet and a depth of hold of 20 feet, which would mean one of the largest craft of her type in the coastwise traffic. At the office of the company in Boston it was said some such vessel was under consideration, and that the management had been figuring as to her construction. Agent Williams could not say that any ship had been definitely decided upon, except that a new one was to be constructed, and that she would in all probability be of the propeller type.
