

CHURCH ES BURNED

Blame Suffragettes For Firing Them

Militants Win Release From Prison in Short Order

Water and Hunger Strike Combined Soon Make Them Subjects for Hospital— Clergyman Joins Fanatics in Endeavor to Break Up Lloyd George's Speech.

London, July 8.—Seven suffragettes and their six male companions, one of whom was a clergyman, were ejected from a public property during the course of a speech this afternoon by Chancellor Lloyd-George at a garden party organized by the radicals at West Islington. Despite the chancellor's plea that the removal of the disturbers be done gently, one woman was so badly mauled that she had to receive medical treatment. From that on Mr. Lloyd-George's speech was without interruption.

A Methodist church on the Welsh seacoast town of Pwllheli, whose construction recently cost \$40,000, was destroyed by fire this morning and an attempt was made also to burn down the Baptist tabernacle in the same town.

This is the fourth case of sacrilege in northern Wales during the week. As is usual when an incendiary fire occurs at the present time, the militant suffragettes are suspected by the authorities, but no evidence was found to incriminate them.

Another supposed attempt by militant suffragettes to commit an outrage on public property occurred at Bolton, Lancashire, this morning when the caretaker of the new town hall, which cost \$150,000, discovered a parcel containing explosives in the letterbox. A fuse, which was attached, had been lit and had gone out.

Miss Annie Kenney and Miss Rachel Barrett, the first of whom was undergoing eighteen months imprisonment and the second nine months imprisonment on a conviction for committing malicious damage to property were released from jail this morning, suffering from the effects of a "hunger strike." Miss Kenney is reported to be very ill.

Many of the militant suffragettes refrain from taking both food and water and their condition consequently weakens very rapidly so that the authorities are obliged to release them from jail more frequently on license under the provisions of the "cat and mouse bill," by which they are set at liberty when ill, and re-arrested on their recovery.

Miss Sylvia Pankhurst failed to appear at Bow street police court this morning to answer a summons charging her with inciting a crowd to raid the official residence in Downing street of Premier Asquith and Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd-George on June 29, when a violent conflict between the police and the suffragettes with their sympathizers took place. A warrant was at once issued for her arrest.

CALAIS MAN FOUND DEAD ON BEACH

Belief That Hugh Priest Fell Over Wharf at Low Tide and Was Killed.

Calais, Me., July 8.—The body of Hugh Priest, aged thirty-two years, was found on the beach of R. T. Horton's cock dock this morning. There was a deep wound on the right side of the neck and the right ear was badly cut. The general impression is that he fell off the wharf when the tide was out and struck on an old log. There was no water in his lungs. An autopsy will be made.

WRECK TIME EXPRESS

On the Track on Curve Near Derby Forty Miles an Hour—Engine Part Little Damage was Done— Miscellaneous.

60,000 IN ST. JOHN.

I. C. R. PASSENGERS TO ST. JOHN SUFFER INEXCUSABLE DELAY

No Connection With Delayed Ocean Limited Late Friday, and They Had to Take Middle-of-Night Train.

The train which arrived in St. John Saturday morning at 6 o'clock from Moncton carried probably more indignant passengers than any coming from any city in many years. More than twenty Pullman passengers bound for St. John on the Ocean Limited which was due in Moncton Friday afternoon at 8 o'clock were compelled to wait there until 8.30 Saturday morning before they could get a train for St. John; and the delay and extra expense to which they were subjected was the loss of time and temper, and the failure to get any satisfaction from the I. C. R. officials caused them to be highly—and justly—indignant.

St. John and its passengers have been receiving very shabby treatment from the Intercolonial for some time past, which they were subjected to the loss of no proper connection from St. John with the Ocean Limited. Until the summer arrangements were filed for St. John, it was getting the kind of service which is known as "branch line towns." And St. John doesn't like that at all.

The inconvenience and serious loss of time connected with the delay of the Ocean Limited morning merely repeats the experience of hundreds during the last few weeks.

There were many passengers on the Ocean Limited bound for St. John that it was clearly the business of the I. C. R. authorities to arrange for a connection at Moncton by holding another train to run on a small special and forward them to their destination.

Many women passengers who had through tickets were compelled to buy extra meal and two, and some of them, who naturally expected to be in St. John on time had not provided money for extra in the way of meals and sleeping accommodations. Those people were thus subjected to great annoyance through no fault of their own.

Some of the Pullman passengers on the Ocean Limited were told that they only had parlor car tickets through to St. John, they must pay extra for berths. Some of them promptly refused to do so, saying that they had through tickets and seats and that they would not give up another cent.

The train officials were helpless and pleaded that they were not responsible and must merely carry out their orders. But they did not get any money.

At Moncton when it was found that passengers who had reached that city nearly four hours late on the Ocean Limited were to be detained there until 8.30 a.m., the facts were brought to the attention of all of the I. C. R. officials within reach, but every one of them said that Messrs. Gutelius and Brady were away and that in their absence nothing could be done. They were asked if the Intercolonial was running when these men were out of town, and they could make no satisfactory reply.

There was nothing to do but to wait until the "middle-of-the-night" train, which left at 11.15 p.m. and 1.15 a.m., and the passengers finally got started for St. John. They made some very warm comments on intercolonial conditions and St. John has not yet heard of the matter.

St. John should not put up with such treatment.
