Washington, Oct. 15.

A special despatch to the *Times* says that a man who learned from Sharnburg that a gentleman, who arrived there on Saturday from Richmond, says that there are at least 200 Confederate soldiers between Gordonsville and Winchester. The Confederate force which robbed the steamer *Hazelton* yesterday at Casseyville, commanded by Col. Anderson, Johnson and Martin, is supposed to have numbered about 2,000. They took about \$3,000 worth of clothing, groceries and powder, and threatened to burn all the boats falling to their hands after the first of the month.

Two transports, the *Admiral* and *Philadelphia*, laden with ordnance stores, were captured at Columbus today. The first originated in the cabin of the *Admiral* and is supposed to be the work of an incendiary. While the *Admiral* was burning the steers of the *Philadelphia*, 10,000 keels of
