"You would be surprised at the loss from breakages alone. Last year our firm lost \$3,000 from broken bottles. Of course frosty weather has a lot to do with it, and as this has been a milder winter the damage may not be so great; but if our customers would co-operate with us in promptly returning bottles, and in taking proper care of them while in their possession, it would have an immediate tendency to still further reduce the price of milk.

"It may surprise many people to know that an empty pint bottle is worth more than the milk which may be put into it, while a quart bottle is worth about just as much as the fluid it contains. "Then, there are other incidental items of expense which milk consumers
