PRICES STILL REMAIN HIGH

There was an exceptionally large crowd at the regular weekly market held this morning both buyers and sellers held in large numbers and while there was an abundance of produce offered, it was not equal to the demand. As a result prices in all lines remained firm, in fact the tendency was upwards if anything. Eggs, new laid, were scarce and the few offered sold readily at 75 cents per dozen. Butter remained firm at 60 cents per lb. There was a good supply of farm and garden produce on hand, celery, beans, onions, endive, radishes and such like selling at the regular prices of 5 cents per lb. Chickens were plentiful and sold readily at 35 cents per lb., the supply being equal to the demand. The market was a brisk one.

ROSS RIFLE GOES?

Toronto riflemen are indignant at the report from Quebec which describes the military authorities, of three score loads of Lee-Enfield .303 ammunition which is said to have been taken out into the river and dumped. It is reported to be surplus stock for which the Government had no use.

Riflemen here state that the Toronto Armories are being fitted with new racks to accommodate the Lee-Enfield rifle in the place of the Ross with which the Toronto units were formerly armed. They cannot understand the destruction of ammunition which has been so hard to get through the past year for rifle practice.

One critic declared that the cases alone would be valuable, and added that he would have been pleased to take a machine gun to the ranges and put in a day's shooting to salvage the brass.

Motorists come and go at the police quarters. Before they leave they hand over a few dollars to the city. The reasons are evident.

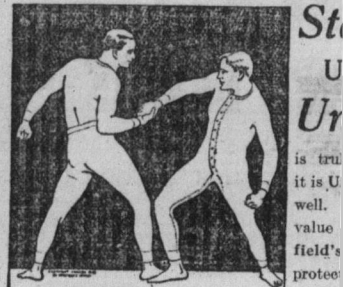
Repairs Under Way
