## New Franchise Act

PRESENT PLAN IS TO REFUSE VOTE FOR TIME TO THOSE NATURALIZED WITHIN THE PAST TEN YEARS.

OTTAWA, March 13.—The Cabinet is about to give final consideration to the New Franchise Act, involving as it does the War-Times Election Act. Many contrary views on the question are expressed by the Government following in Parliament and in the Government itself there does not appear to be exact unanimity.

It is stated that the present outlook is for a modification of the bill but not for its repeal. Where all naturalized aliens are now disfranchised the tentative proposal is to apply the handicap only to those naturalized in the last 10 years, and, among them, to make an exception of certain nationalities, or parts of them, whose war attitude has been sympathetic to the allies. It is understood that this question is a part of the bill not so contentious as the method of preparing the list. Those who advocate provincial lists as the basis of the federal franchise have some support, but, on the other hand, the system of enumeration by federal officers

is insisted on in other quarters. After the bill is finally drafted by the Cabinet it will be submitted to the ministerial caucus.

## NEW YORK CLERK FIRST VICTIM OF "SLEEPING SICKNESS" IN THAT CITY.

NEW YORK, March 13.—The first death in this city from "sleeping sickness" was reported to the health department today. Erskine W. Martin, a clerk, 35 years old, became ill five days ago, went to sleep, a day after and remained in a state of coma until

he died according to the attending physician. Health Commissioner Cope land, declaring only 18 cases of the malady had been reported in Europe and three others in this country of which two had been fatal, said there was no cause for alarm.

Mr. Copeland said there are eight suspected cases in New York, all in private homes.

## GERMAN PRESS AROUSED OVER POSSIBLE LOSS OF DANZIG.

PARIS, March 13.—The negotiations between the German delegates and members of the interallied mission to Poland over the Polish frontier situation have been broken off by the German delegates, according to The Berlin Tagesschau Rundschau, as quoted in a dispatch to Le Journal from Zurich. The Germans have already left Posen, "as a protest against their treatment by the allies," the newspaper reports.

## Bishop Explains Riots at Kimmel

### DISAPPOINTMENT OF MEN IN NOT GETTING HOME WAS THE CAUSE

London, March 13.—The Bishop of St. Asaph writes to the Times: "As one closely associated with and near Kimmel Camp, the Canadians bore the discomforts inevitable to the perpetually changing demobilization camp week after week to war-worn men, yearning for home have been a serious matter."

Describing the situation as seen he says: "A man arrives at Kimmel having been told he is to sail in a few days for Canada and is disappointed. The weeks pass and he is still there; he may have been in the fighting line and sees those who had little or no fighting allowed to sail before him. Thus the fire began to smoulder. It bursts into flame when he illustrated Canadian papers, the men saw acclimated on their arrival conscripts who had done no fighting. I doubt whether Englishmen would have borne similar conditions without protest. I am certain Welshmen would not."

Those in charge of the canteens which I know well, speak in high terms of praise of the conduct of the men. The ladies resident in their neighborhood opened a canteen of their own accord for the Canadians who crowd our village on Sundays. Amid the hundreds who visited that canteen there was not one single instance of rudeness or roughness. We in this countryside are indeed proud to have amongst us those men who fought so gallantly for the Motherland."
