Wilmot Township Council Meeting

Wilmot Council met at the Township Hall, Baden, on Monday the 17th day of March. All members were present. Minutes of the February Session were read and adopted.

Communications from Rural Municipal Association of Ont. acknowledging receipt of membership fee, from Sec. of Wilmot Agri. Soc. soliciting increase of grant for Wilmot Spring Fair, Department of Agriculture asking for a Township Representative, Stratford Good Roads Asso. for endorsement of resolution. Council endorsed same.

Moved by Hy. Walker and John Herber that Geo. Z. Lantz be appointed a representative to the Board of Agriculture.

Moved an amendment by my. ahrang and S. Hunsperger that Hy. Walker be appointed as a representative. The amendment carried.

Moved by J. Herber and H. Walker that we grant the Wilmot Agri. Soc. the sum of \$33.00 toward their Spring Fair at Baden. Ten dollars to be refunded if there are no seed entries. Cd.

Moved by J. Herber and Hy. Walker that leave be given the mover to introduce a by-law to appoint Pathmasters, Fenceviewers, Poundkeepers, Herd Inspector, Truant Officer and Tax Collector for the year 1919 and 1920. Cd.

Moved by S. Hunsperger and H. Nahrang that leave be given the mover to introduce a by-law to borrow a certain sum of money to meet the necessary and current expenses of 1919 until the taxes are paid and said by-law to be now read a first and second time.

Moved by S. Hunsperger and H. Nahrang that this Council go into Committee of the whole on by-laws.

H. Nahrang in the chair when Pathmasters, Fenceviewers, Poundkeepers, Herd Inspector, Truant Officer and Tax Collector were appointed as per by-law, and that \$10,000 be inserted in the money by-law.
