

SIR SAM HUGHES CLAIMS BARON FLAVELLE MADE

\$100,000,000 During The Four Years of War

ATTACKS CANADIAN COMMAND AT THE FRONT.

OTTAWA, March 4.—Gen. Sir Sam Hughes, always successful in stirring up excitement when he takes the floor. Today was no exception. Gen. Hughes took a fling at the Union Government, for which he has no love, hanged Sir Joseph Flavelle and took a sly dig at Sir Thomas White. The most sensational feature of his speech was an attack on the Canadian command at the front.

He then referred to his early com-

ments on the Military Service Act. It did not require anyone of great legal sagacity, he said, to see in the act opportunity to every man to say at home who wanted to. There were various forms of government, Sir Sam proceeded. But there was only one form which should be encouraged, the form of responsible Government—government by the people, through the people, and for the people. Sir Sam went on to refer to the composition of the government of Sir John A. MacDonald, in 1878, of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in 1896, and of Sir Robert Borden,

in 1911. These, he said, formed a legitimate coalition, as compared with what he termed "the machine" made affair of Sir Joseph Flavelle and the City of Toronto, a remark which aroused loud cheers from the Opposition.

Attacks W.M. Act. Referring to the War Measures Act, Sir Sam declared he had yet to see the necessity for any departure from responsible Government. He had yet to see wherein any country a War Measures Act had advanced the interests of the country.

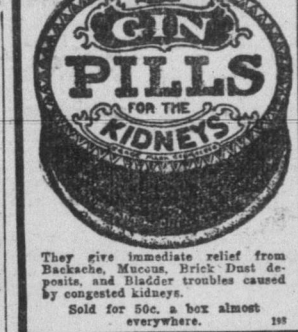
He could not see that the food control business was of any use in Canada—it was some times a con-founded nuisance—or that coal control was on any utility except to add three to five dollars a ton to the cost of coal in many instances. If Canada was to have autonomy in war time, then why not autonomy in peace time?

"If this is to be so," went on Sir Sam, "let us, in the name of heaven, send for the Kaiser and establish him in power here."

These things were not necessary and Sir Sam would challenge any

man to show him the necessity of one single movement of autocratic Government.

There were those who went around saying they took no stock in politics. Sir Sam had never seen such a man, but had come to the conclusion that he wanted watching.

Need Watching. Sir Sam went on to say that he had made a careful study of human nature and he had never yet seen one of these gentlemen, preacher or no preacher, who did not need to be watched.

There was, he said, a spirit of independence abroad on both sides of the House. The Government could have its hands full to cajole, bribe, bully, push, down and out-track gentlemen on its side.

Sir Sam said that amongst the difficulties he had to overcome in 1914 in raising the forces was prejudice, jealousy and envy on the part of some of his colleagues. Sir George Perley seemed to think that it was his duty to conspire in 1915 to overthrow Gen. Hughes.

He also found himself handicapped by certain news papers in Montreal and Toronto, one of which was edited by a brother of Sir Thomas White, and who had since been rewarded by being appointed head of the Dominion Public Information Bureau.

He caused a good deal of laughter by referring to the Toronto Empire Club meeting in 1916, at which, he said, it was stated that "Borden had no backbone, and would have to get out." There were canvassers at the meeting, representing financial and insurance organizations.

The aspirations of Sir Joseph Flavelle, canvassing against Borden and demanding that he make way for another man. He said that the agents or friends of these organizations, under the same auspices, had a conspiracy in 1915 to overthrow Gen. Bertram and the shell committee and control munitions in Canada.

Meat Contracts. Gen. Hughes said that Sir Joseph Flavelle finally became head of the munitions department and then they found this distinguished citizen ge-

ting contracts for meat in the United States and in Canada and making large profits. They had heard about the profits in Canada, but nothing had been heard about the operations in the United States. Sir Sam asserted that Sir Joseph had got \$5,000,000 a month for contracts through his influence as head of the munitions board. He declared that Sir Joseph Flavelle had made \$100,000,000 during the four years of war.

Says Advice Asked. Sir Sam stated that he had been invited by Premier Borden to meet him at the close of the 1918 session, just before the premier departed for England. Sir Robert, the speaker said, had asked him at this meeting to advise him as to what course should be pursued in the administration of the Canadian army.

He declined to give any advice on the matter, telling the premier that he was no longer one of his advisers and was therefore not in a position to give him counsel.

The magnificent influence of the Canadian High Commissioner had exercised its power over Sir Robert Borden ever since the war started, said Sir Sam.

The former Minister of Militia then went on to speak of protests which he had made against the waste of Canadian boys' lives in unnecessary stunts on the battlefield. He read a letter which he wrote to Sir Robert Borden, urging that the prime minister demand that this waste of valuable life immediately cease. The letter follows:

"Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 1, 1918. 'Dear Sir Robert: 'Once more I desire to draw your attention to the needless massacre of our Canadian boys as has needlessly occurred at Cambrai. Mark you, I am not one who thinks wars can be won without the loss of human life, but Gen. Foch has shown the world, what I have always claimed, that mind conquers matter."

The Motive Alleged. "I have on other occasions drawn your attention to the massacres at Lens, Passchendaele, etc., where the only apparent object was to glorify the general in command and make it impossible through butchery to have a fifth and sixth division and two army corps.

"In the present case, however, around Cambrai it seems simply a case of 'bull head' and sending up our gallant lads against positions swarming with machine guns and without our boys being properly supported by tanks or guns to destroy these machine gun positions.

You may remember I have suggested repeatedly this sort of thing—guns to destroy machine gun positions since the outbreak of the war. I have no details other than general and special reports, but I know the locality thoroughly, and any general who would undertake to attack Cambrai by suburbs or street fighting should be tried by court-martial. The only way is to go around the dam thing, as the American attaché said to General Butler at Colono.

"I think the time has arrived when you should assert yourself along positive lines, demand the removal of incompetents and have this needless slaughter—for I call it nothing else—of our Canadian lads stopped.

"You should secure returns of the losses by brigades and battalions during each year or tenure of command, and what each brigade accomplished, and it will be found
