The season has been a backward one but the fine warm weather of the past week has brought the blossoms along rapidly and the early trees in most sections are now in full bloom, while the later varieties are coming out rapidly. Orchards in Kings county are receiving more than the ordinary amount of attention this Spring and orchardists are expecting and preparing for a bumper crop of fruit. During the next few days those who wish to see the "garden of Nova Scotia" at its best, should plan to visit Wolfville and the surrounding countryside.

TOWN COUNCIL

An emergency meeting of the Council was held on Monday evening for the purpose of considering a petition largely signed by citizens residing in the section affected, against the erection of the gasoline and oil storage tank of the Imperial Oil Co.

Mayor Sutherland and all the members of the Council were present as well as a number of citizens and Mr. Shatford, of the Imperial Oil Co. The latter was called upon and addressed the Council at length stating the conditions and the nature of the work being carried out. Rev. R. F. Dixon and Messrs. J. D. Chambers, J. L. Franklin and Jonathan Hayes were also heard and after some discussion a resolution was passed expressing the view of the Council that no valid reasons had been given for suspending the work and advising the Building Committee to grant the customary permit.

The Council then met as the Building Committee and granted the permit to the Imperial Oil Co. for the erection of a wagon-house and of cement foundations for tank. A permit was also granted Mr. A. M. Wheaton for the re-erection of a small building north of the railway track, to be used as a blacksmith shop.

DR. CUTTEN'S RESIGNATION

Accepted by Board of Governors—
Will Take Effect July 31st.

The resignation of Dr. George B. Cutten, president of Acadia University, was before the Board of Governors at the meeting held on Wednesday afternoon. It is understood that the resignation was reluctantly accepted and a committee composed of Dr. Manning, Dr. Cohoon, Dr. I. B. Oakes, Messrs. E. C. Whitman, W. G. Clark, W. C. Cross and O. P. Goucher, was appointed to name his successor. Dr. Cutten has filled the position of president since 1910 and under his direction the work of the university has grown and developed. Present rumors of his appointment to the presidency of Colgate University prepared the public for the news of his resignation, which was heard, however, with very general regret.

The matter of the federation of the colleges of the Maritime Provinces according to the proposal of the Carnegie Foundation came up for discussion, and a committee, composed of Dr. Cutten, Dr. Cohoon, Dr. J. H. MacDonald, Dr. C. W. Rose and Messrs. W. G. Clark, O. P. Goucher, E. C. Whitman and Hon. E. N. Rhodes was appointed to confer with similar committees from other interested institutions concerning the proposal.
