Flying Officer George M. Kightley, Barrie, has been appointed adjutant of No. 1 Service Flying Training School, Camp Borden, effective Dec. 8. He succeeded Flight Lieutenant A. W. Rogers, who was posted to Clinton.

Born and educated in Barrie, George Kightley left the employ of Barrie-Allandale Dairy to enlist in the RCAF Permanent Force, April, 1939, at Camp Borden as a clerk with rank of AC2. He remained at Borden until June, 1940, when he was posted to Air Force Headquarters at Ottawa with the rank of Corporal, and worked in the Air Records Office. He was commissioned in August, 1941, and posted to the Officers' Records Office. Later, he became Personal Staff Officer to Air Commodore E. E. Middleton, Deputy Air Member for Personnel, former Senior Administrative Officer at Camp Borden in 1939-40.

FO Kightley re-mustered for aircrew in January, 1943. He trained at No. 1 ITS, Toronto, No. 20 EFTS, Oshawa, and received his pilot's wings at Camp Borden in September. Following a course at Trenton, he was posted back to Borden again in December as a flying instructor, which position he has capably filled for a year.

Younger son of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Kightley, 44 Brock St., George has an elder brother, Major Roy Kightley, with Canadian Postal Corps in Italy. Both his sisters are also serving—Nursing Sister D. E. Daylock (nee Betty Kightley), and LAW Evelyn Kightley is with the RCAF (WD) at Camp Borden as clerk-accountant.

FO Kightley is the first Barrie native son to hold an executive position at the nearby Camp Borden RCAF School. Camp Borden seems to be his destined place—there he first enlisted—there he got his pilot's wings—there he was returned as flying instructor, and now as adjutant.
