already brevetted Saint by the church.

Elizabeth Bruvère was one of the pioneer religious educators of Upper Canada, where indeed the United Empire Lovalists had firmly implanted their noble and sturdy traditions, and where the descendants of Scotch Covenanters had transplanted to New World soil the hardy tenacity of their native hills, but where likewise the "Exile of Erin" and the loval lover of the fleur-de-lys, anxious to amass for their heirs a heritage of supernatural faith, demanded for their daughters, particularly, the advantage of that careful educational training—character-building under organized, gentle, consecrated womanly influence—which they knew was necessary to this end.

Perhaps it will count among the discoveries of this psychologic age that the church has always had in practice what the most thoughtful educators of the present day augur in the signs of the times. Witness an eminent authority in a recent number of an educational organ, predicting that the education
