For Felon-Take equal parts of gum and camphor, gum opium, castile soap and brown sugar; wet to a paste with spirits of turpentine. Prepare it and apply a thick plaster of it.

Chestnut Patties-After boiling and mashing, add to one pint of chestnuts a half eup of cream or two rounded tablespoonsful creamed butter, a cup and a half milk, two well beaten eggs, quar-ter of a cup of sugar and salt to season. Beat well, turn into little patty tins filled with rich paste and bake quickly.

Creamed Potatoes-Wash potatoes and cook in boiling salted water with their jacgets on. Drain, and let stand twenty-four hours. Peel, and cut into one-third Sprinkle with salt and geninch cubes. erously with papriya. Add thin cream just to cover the potatos, and cook very slowly for forty-five minutes. Success depends upon the long, slow cooking.

Pumpkin Pie-When pumpkins are cheap and eggs are dear, the housewife wonders whether it is economy to waste wonders whether it is economy to waste the pumpkin or invest in thirty-cent eggs. But instead of following the us-ual rule of two eggs to a pie, let her stir into the pumpkin finely rolled cracker erumbs, one rounded tablespoonful to a pie. If this is done, three eggs well beaten will be sufficient for three pies, as the crackers help to thicken without making the pumpkin heavy or soggs. Mince Meat-Three teacupsful of cook ed beef chopped, six teacupsful of half sweet and half sour chopped apples, a teacupful of chopped suct, two teacups ful of grape or other acid fruit juice, two teacupsful of raisins, a teacupful each of sugar and molasses, a level tablespoonful each of cinamon and clotablespoontul each of chranich and the yes, a small nutmeg grated, half a tea-spoonful each of salt and pepper. Scald the suet, add it to the other ingredients. except the spices, and bring to boiling heat, then add spices. Fill the crust with meat, sprinkle over sugar, and dot with bits of butter; cover, and bake.


