NEWS FROM IRELAND

DUBLIN.

It is understood that the executive of the Land League have decided to carefully supervise in future all placards convening meetings throughout the country, so as to prevent the prohibition of future meetings arising from the use in placards of unguarded and unsuitable language.

A man named Patrick Timmons was sentenced to two months' imprisonment in Dublin, on January 6th, for having attempted to "Boycott" some of Mr. Bence Jones's cattle when passing through England a short time back.

WICKLOW.

On January 1st, one of the largest meetings has been held in the county Wicklow, took place a short distance from the town of Timahilly. Among those who were present on the platform was a gentleman representing a leading Vienna journal, who has been sent to Ireland to write a series of letters on the land question. The chair was taken by Mr. Coates, of Tankersley.

KILDARE.

On Jan. 1st, a Land League meeting was held in the Market-square of N. as. The attendance was very large. Rev. Thomas Moran, P. P., took the chair.

KILKENNY.

At Kilkenny, on Jan. 6th, the Rev. M. Cody, President of the Mullinavar branch of the Land League, and two members of the court, were committed for trial at the assizes, on the charge of Boycotting a farmer named Darby Walsh.

LOUTH.

A Drogheda land meeting intended to be held on January 24, having been forbidden, it was attempted to hold a meeting there on January 1st, but the two Resident Magistrates, who had been sent especially to the town, promptly stopped and dispersed it, after reading the Riot Act.

CORK.

On Jan. 4th, Mr. Philip Barry, engineer, Cork, accepted Griffith's valuation on his Ballinahina property, and gave receipts in full to the tenantry.

On January 1st, a great land meeting was held at Fermoy, county Cork, Limerick, Tipperary, and Waterford. There was an ap-rehension during the week that the meeting would be prohibited, as some meetings in the district were proclaimed; the authorities, however, did not interfere with it. The Rev. W. Rice presided.

About fifty men of the following class appeared on Jan. 5th, before the guardians of the Fermoy Workhouse to demand work or relief. Three spokesmen of the laborers were admitted to explain their wants to the guardians. They said that they themselves and their fellow-workmen sought employment in vain, and that they were entirely destitute of food and fuel for themselves and families. In reply, the members of the Board stated they would communicate with the Local Government authorities for instructions, and that they would be able to speak more definitely in a week hence. The laborers, disappointed, left in a body, inveighing against the guardians for not relieving their destitution.

KERRY.

Large crowds, with bands, paraded the streets of Tralee on January 6th, and cheered outside the houses of members of the Land League who had been committed to prison, three of whom are Town Commissioners.

LIMERICK.

All the criminal business of the Quarter Sessions at Rathkeale, county Limerick, was, in consequence of the disturbed condition of the county, and the unlikelihood of procuring jurors influenced by fear or favor, transferred to the next Assizes.

The death has just been announced of the Very Rev. Robert Dore, ex-Superior of the Augustinian Order of Friars, Limerick, with which convent he had been for close upon fifty years associated.

CLARE.

On January 6th, the house of Martin Nugent, farmer, Barnalarch, near Cloncheen, Ennis, was entered by three men with rifles and bayonets, who made him swear to give three hundred pounds each to three sons of a late tenant who was evicted and went to America. After leaving, one man returned and fired at Nugent, who received several shots.

Mr. Francis Burton, of Barnelly Castle, finding, as he says, he has appealed in vain to the British Government for sufficient protection of his family and property, has now appealed to the French Government, he having been naturalized as a Frenchman since 1870, on his marriage with the daughter of the Duke and Duchess de Rovigo. His appeal is published in all the Paris papers.

Lord Stanley, of Akeley, who came over from England to the county Clare to spend the Christmas holidays at Emistymon House, the residence of Mr. Macnamara, was Boycotted in consequence of a recent letter to the Times, comparing the Irish people to Thugs. Eight constables are guarding the house.

TIPPERARY.

Four shopkeepers of Cloncheen, Tipperary, have been brought up, charged with Boycotting a farmer by refusing to sell him goods. One was committed to the Assizes on a charge of conspiracy and intimidation, and the others were committed to prison.

On Jan. 7th, there was quite a sensation

at the Cappa Barracks. The men were obliged to retire within the gates, and the sentinels were doubled. The tower was guarded for the first time since the apprehended attacks on the barracks in '48.

ANTRIM.

On Jan. 6th, two men, who were driving on a side-car into Belfast, were passing the residence of the Rev. Father Mulvaney, one of them fired two shots in succession at the house from a double-barrelled gun. Fortunately no one was injured, though the priest and his servant were in the house at the time. It was also believed that it was the same party who, a few minutes before, fired at the residence of a private gentleman, who is a Catholic convert. Although there is a police barracks within six or seven minutes' walk of the place, the perpetrators so wanted an outrage drove past it unimpeded.

The recent death is announced of the Rev. John Henry Lennon, P. P., Loughguile. The blow was not unexpected, as he had been ailing for almost two years. Father Lennon was born in the town of Moy on the 8th of December, 1833.

DOWN.

At a meeting of Lord Gosford's tenantry at Newry on January 7th, for the purpose of considering his reply to the memorial from the tenants asking an abatement of 25 per cent., it was announced he would grant 10 per cent.; whereupon 500 tenants present resolved to pay no rent except at the reduction demanded.

CAVAN.

On January 4th, a land agent visited Arvagh, county Cavan, for the purpose of receiving rents. On his arrival he was refused admittance to a hotel, and had to sleep under a counter in a shop. When the tenants arrived they offered a half year's rent on the condition that the agent received a full receipt for the year, but the proposal was declined.

GALWAY.

Nine hundred men assembled at Milltown, on January 3d, to rebuild houses of evicted tenants, and to divide some farms among them. The police were present in large force. The countrymen were not interfered with in their work of thatching cottages. Their original intention was to cut the land in strips. There was great excitement in Milltown, and fifty soldiers of the Rifle Brigade marched there from Tuam, and large bodies of police attended, but all was quiet.

MAYO.

The Landlord League have supplied the Marquis of Sligo's steward (Mr. Edbrook) with a number of servants, the old ones having left on receipt of threatening letters.

Mr. Pike, of Achill, is being "Boycotted." Notices have been extensively posted up, warning all bailiffs, shore-rangers, domestic servants, &c., to give up their positions at once. The upshot of the matter is that an extra force of police have been sent to the island. Indeed the people enjoyed a hearty laugh the other day when they saw Mr. Pike and his two sons out shooting, accompanied by two Resident Magistrates. Even the little boys refused to carry the victims of the day's sport.

On January 7th, the sounding of horns on the surrounding hills at Foxford, announced that process-serving was going on. About one thousand people and eighty police met at Ballyvaughan bridge over the Moy. The police held back the people on the bridge and allowed the process-server to proceed with an escort. The people, however, crossed the river in pursuit, although over their waists in water. An affray afterwards ensued. The police charged and the people flung stones. Two policemen were wounded, one very severely. There was great excitement at Foxford, as about forty police guarding the process-server marched through the evening.

On January 4th, an iron hat erected on Mr. O'Donnell's farm near Castlebar, whose herds have been "Boycotted," was conveyed there by artillery, with wagons &c., who arrived from Athlone. The hat was guarded by troops of dragoons and four of the constabulary with fixed bayonets. The cavalcade was waulike and attracted considerable attention as it proceeded through the town, some surmising that the "disturbance" was about commencing. A large force of police were dispatched to Hollywood next morning to protect process officers.

ROSCOMMON.

An auctioneer attempted to carry out, at Boyle, on Jan. 3d, a sheriff's sale of a farm from which a man had been evicted. A sum of three pounds was frantically offered by a single bidder, and the sale could not be proceeded with.

At Carnelagh Cemetery, at Athlone, a grave was being dug on Jan. 2d by a young man named F. Rafferty, assistant to the contractor, Patrick Farrell. The latter was a few yards from the grave, and observing that there was no earth being thrown up, proceeded to ascertain the cause, and found Rafferty doubled up in the grave. When taken to the surface life was found to be wholly extinct. It is believed the unfortunate man died from starvation, resulting from a poor way of living.
