# ENGLISH PRINCESSES ON OR NEAR THRONE

Relatives of King Edward  
Queens in Many Euro-  
pean Countries

LONDON, July 26.—Despite the denial that King Manuel of Portugal is to be betrothed to Princess Alexandra of Fife, daughter of the Princess Royal of England, and granddaughter of the King, there is every reason to believe that the announcement, although not

Like young King Alfonso of Spain, the youthful ruler of Portugal will set forth to lead his bride and in all probability the selection will be the Princess Alexandra of Fife, who, until recently was married to the Duke of Albany, is a most charming and attractive girl and is most popular in court circles and in the home of her childhood. Her father, the recently created Duke of Fife, who was but a mere earl when he married the King's daughter, has been raised to the rank of duke because that the Princess Alexandra was presented at court, where she made a most excellent impression.

There are difficulties in the way of the princess' marriage to King Manoel would necessarily be the question of religion. The members of the royal house of Portugal are strict Roman Catholics, while the princess, who belongs to the Protestant church. Because such a difficulty would not necessarily be insurmountable. During her life she like Queen Catherine was called "the Queen Dowager in Law" of Europe. Now her daughter-in-law must be designated the "mother of queens." In almost every country there were some royal houses which bore a close relationship to the throne, or, as it were, were "dynastic matches." The King's third daughter, the former Princess Maud of Wales, is now Queen of Norway; her husband, Prince Haakon VII., is the representative sovereign of that country under the title of King Hakon VII.

Princess Beatrice of Battenberg, who has no children, sister, Princess Henry of Battenberg, is Queen of Spain, while the former Princess Margaret of Connaught, eldest daughter of Queen Victoria, is Queen of Greece. Then the daughter of the Duke of Edinburgh, another brother of King Edward, but now dead, is the Crown Princess of Sweden, and will succeed to the throne when the venerable King Charles passes away.

Of the English princesses who still live, there is only one, Princess Patricia, daughter of the King, who probably will never marry, the Princess Patricia of Connaught, his niece, and the youngest Maud of Fife, his grand-daughter.
