Buyers Return From Abroad

Quite a Number Arrive Here by the Digby from Halifax—Crossed by Empress of Britain—Home Earlier Than Usual.

Messrs. A. Rodger (A. & S. Rodger); I. Perlin (Perlin & Co.); G. Moty. (A. Goodridge & Sons); A. Robertson, (Bishop, Sons & Co., Ltd.); C. J. Bennett, (E. M. Jackman); L. Chafe, (Nichelle, Inkpen & Chafe); Miss Stick and Mrs. Mitchell, who were purchasing new goods in England, returned by the Digby yesterday. They crossed to Halifax by the S.S. Empress of Britain. They are back much earlier than other seasons.

Digby in Port From Halifax

Made a Run of 52 Hours—Delayed by Dense Fog—Brought Considerable Cargo and Number of Passengers.

S.S. Digby, Capt. Trinick, arrived at 1.30 p.m. yesterday after a run of 52 hours from Halifax. She was 20 miles off the port at 8 a.m. yesterday, but owing to dense fog could not get in earlier. She passed through considerable slob ice, but it was not heavy enough to impede the progress of the ship.

The Digby brought 400 tons general cargo, and the following passengers also arrived by her: A. Rodger, I. Perlin, G. Moty, Miss Stick, A. Robertson, Reg. Harvey, Ambrose Gosling, M. Jago, C. J. Bennett, Miss Dixon, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. LeGallais, L. Chafe, Mrs. Chafe and eight in transit.

St. Pierre Ship Is Responsible

Privy Council Hears Appeal of Owners of Steamer St. Pierre-Miquelon and Decides Against Them—Collision Case.

A London cable says that the Privy Council supported the judgment of both the Nova Scotia Court and the Supreme Court of Canada, who found that the French steamer St. Pierre-Miquelon was alone responsible for the collision between herself and the steamship Renwick at Christmas, 1911.

In dismissing the appeal of the Miquelon's owners, the Privy Council directed their attention to their rule, now well settled, that when the question whether concurrent judgment courts below shall be reversed on the ground that the judges have taken an erroneous view of the facts, it is incumbent on the appellant to adduce the clearest proof that there is an error in the judgment appealed from, and so to speak, put his finger on the mistake.

Acting upon that rule their Lordships are clearly of the opinion that the finding of both of the courts on the counterclaim of the St. Pierre-Miquelon cannot be disturbed. The appeal accordingly is dismissed.

We note by the Army and Navy Gazette that Paymaster F. D. Nind has been appointed to H.M.S. Powerful, stationed at Davenport. The Powerful is now a training ship. It will be remembered that she played a prominent part in the South African War. Mr. Nind is a son-in-law of H. W. LeMessurier, Esq., Deputy Minister of Customs.

Skater Injured At The Rink

Mr. Flynn Falls and Gives his Right Hand a Nasty Gash—Attended by Dr. Fraser and Taken Home.

Yesterday afternoon, Nix Flynn, while skating at the Prince's Rink, fell and gave the palm of his right hand a nasty cut. It bled terribly and was dressed by some of his companions. Dr. Fraser was phoned for and he came and had the hand properly attended to. Nix was afterwards driven to his home. His many friends hope that he will soon be o.k. again and that his hand will not give him much trouble.

The Venerable Rev. J. M. Pike, a Native of the "Second City" Still Hale and Heartly in his Adopted Country.

A copy of The Way of Faith, published in Columbia, S.C., states that its venerable editor, the Rev. J. M. Pike, a native of Newfoundland, and formerly a member of the Eastern British American Conference, is still active in the Master's service and accomplishing much good.

In 1898 he established a home for fallen girls, called "The Door of Hope." The work has grown on his hands and since its organization 980 girls have received shelter and care and the great majority of them have been reclaimed to a life of virtue and usefulness.

Mr. Pike's old comrades will wish him Godspeed in his good work.—Wesleyan.
