

LONDON, July 8—Freddie Welsh ightweight champion of England, yesterday beat Willie Ritchie in a 20-ound fight and won the lightweight championship of the world at Olympia In the opening rounds Welsh scored more points than Ritchie. In the fifth round, however, Ritchie forced the fighting and in this and the next two rounds there were some sharp ex-changes and heavy fighting in which Ritchie generally got the upper hand. Several times the American was cautioned for holding in the clinches.

When half the match was over Welsh led easily on points.

Ritchie revived somewhat in the eleventh and there were some hot exchanges in this and the twelfth, Welsh repeatedly by his remarkable quickness scoring and then eluding heavy as of old.

In the thirteenth Ritchie had it all blows and forcing the fighting all
