Waterbury, Conn., Jan. 4—Fire and police officials to-day planned a thorough search of the ruins of the hotel Connecticut, which was burned early to-day, to determine if all the persons in the building escaped. One man, Charles M. Decker, of South Norwalk, Conn., was killed, and six others were injured by jumping from

Manager Haase of the hotel, was positive that all escaped, but his confidence is not shared by the authorities. The fire spread with such great rapidity that the firemen fear that all persons, and especially those on the top floors may not have had time to escape. In less than half an hour after the blaze was discovered the en-tire building was a mass of flames. Czar Gives Address.

London, Jan. 4.—During a review of the Russian army on January 2. Emperor Nicholas delivered an address to the chevaliers of the Order of St. George, acording to a news agency despatch from Petrograd. The Emperor is quoted as saying:
"To you as the most valiant repre

sentatives of our army, I offer my most cordial and profound appreciation of your services which in this campaign have been full of bravery and sacrifices. I beg you to transmit enemy from our territory, and I will only conclude this peace with the full accord of our allies, to whom we are bound, not by paper treaties, but by real friendship and blood.

"I ask you personally to convey to all the troops my recognition of their devoted service which gladens heart. May God protect you."
