

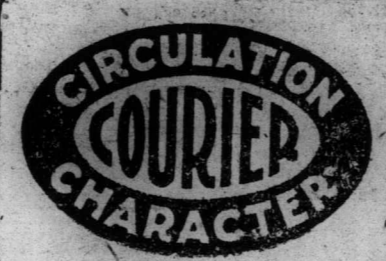

SYNOPIER (CANADIAN) NORTH WEST LAND SEVERATIONS. The sole heir of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Entry—Six months residence upon said cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section. Duties—reads six months in each of three years after settling homesteaded patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption rights as soon as homesteaded on certain conditions. A settler after obtaining homesteaded patent, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years. Cultivate to acre and erect a house worth \$500.00. Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions. When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive a priority in applying for entry at local Agency's Office (but not Sub-Agency). 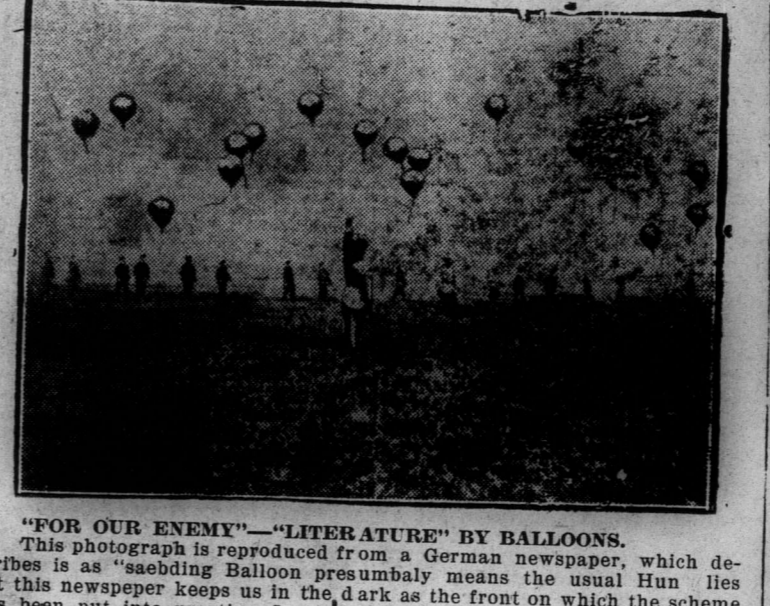
