The average seven day record of the three nearest dams is 30.88 lbs. of butter with over 100 lbs. of milk per day, while one of the paternal granddams holds the Canadian Championship in the eight months after calving division with 19.02 lbs. of butter in seven days, the other being the 36 lb. cow Lula Keyes recognized by American breeders as exemplifying perfect Holstein type. Wentworth county can now offer outside buyers selection from herds carrying breeding equal to any owned in America.
