# One Man Killed, One Dying

CRAZY MAN'S DEED IN BROCKVILLE

Brockville, Ont., March 9.—Never in its history of nearly a century has the town of Brockville been so convulsed and thrown into such a terrible state of excitement as it was to-day at noon by the enactment in broad dâylight, and on one of its leading thoroughfares, of one of the most awful tragedies ever occurring in the Dominion of Canada. The total result of the tragic affair was one man shot dead on the spot, the Chief of Police mortally wounded, another member of the force seriously injured, an Indian badily hurt, and six others serioring me for or less from wounds inflicted by a sirgle man armed with a breech-loading shotgun; and the cause of all the turible destruction and suffering is himself lying at the point of death from wounds inflicted by shots fred at him in order to put a stop to his death-dealing work and effect his capture.

The town clock had just struck the noon hour, and the streets were thronged with people on their way to dinner. Suddenly the sharp crack of a gun was heard in the western end of the town, which caused the hurrying crowd to stop and ascertain the cause. This was followed by other reports in quick succession—Soon the news spread that several persons had been shot, and the excitement became intense. The cause of all the trouble was a man named Lapointe, who resides about its milles noth of the town on what is known as the Perth road. He has usually been looked upon as of not very sound mind, but generally inoffensive, except when under the influence of liquor. He was a noted foxhunter, and usually carried a gun in his rambles about the country. He was in town on Saturday, and had I cen drinking some. He left his horses at an hotel here and must have walked home that night. His movements during the early part of to-day are not known as yet, though it is supposed he walked into them. At all events, just about noon he made his appearance on Perth street, walking in the direction of King street he suddenly threw his head back and gave vent to several loud yells such as fox-hunter

murderer.

The latter was all the time standing at the point where had first stationed himself, and at each discharge of his murderous weapon could be seen calmly taking loaded cartridges from his pocket and reloading. Constable Tinsley, who was in the police headquarters, only a few rods away, came out, and from behind the weigh scales close by was firing at Lapointe with a revolver. The range was too long and his shots proved ineffective. All this time Lapointe was firing as fast as he could, and several persons were more or less injured.

Finally. Tinsley secured possassion of a shotgun and crossed over to a grocery store kept by Mix. Ming street. In order to get at Lapointe, Tinsley stepped out on the sidewalk, and just as he raised his arm Lapointe fired and the constable had to retreat, povered with bloomeantime two or three parties armed with guns and revolvers had got to the upper windows of adjacent buildings and fired at Lapointe. All at once Lapointe was seen to drop his gun and fall to the ground. One of the shots had struck him in the abdomen and another in the les. The angry mob made a rush for the murderer the moment he fell. Selzing him they dragged-him-to-the-centre-of-the-road. Cries of "Shoot him!" Lynch him!" were heard above the din. By the efforts of some of the more cool-headed, the mob were prevented from carrying their threats into execution, and Lapointe was taken to the police station and locked up in a cell.

When quilet had been somewhat restred, the scene presented was agonizing in the extreme. The body of the old man Moore lay on the sidewalk cold in death. In a store adjoining Chief of Police Rose lay suffering terribly from his wounds. The old Indian lay on the sidewalk covered with blood, and the was about. wealthy man owning nearly a thousand acres of lang close to Brockville
at the time of his death. He left all
his family in good circumstances. The
murderer, now lying at the point of
death, was always of a morse, gloomy
disposition, and would go for days
without speaking to anyone. When he
came to town he would, sometimes get

the worse of liquor, and when In That, condition was dangerous and seemed to have a sort of mania for humas life. Last summer he got on a spree and was arrested and lodged in jair for some days. Since then it is said he has, entertained a grudge at the police, which may account for his selecting the chief as his first victim. Lapointe is about 35 years of age. He is unmarried and lives on his farm, a sister keeping house for him. Peter Moore, who was shot dead, came here from Hamilton five or six years ago, and has been employed most of the time with Mr. Heather, a florist. His first wife died in Hamilton, but a family of several sons and daughters still reside there. One of his sons holds an important no spectator. Moore married again after coming to Brockville.

Chief Rose came here five years peg from Dundas, where he held the position of chief of polic. The whole affair has cast a sad gloom over the town, and so deep is the feeling among all classes that business has been practically suspended ever since it happened.

The Annual Report of the Agricultural

College,
Friday afternoon Hon, J. M. Gibson brought down the report of the
Ontario Agricultural College and Ex-

son brought down the report of the Contario Agricultural College and Experimental Farm.

The number of students at the college in 1895 was 250—150 in the general course and 100 in the dairy school. Of those in the general course, exactly 80 per cent.—nearly all farmers' sonswere from the Province of Ontario. Six of the 100 dairy students were non-residents—four from Quebec and the east-dent provinces, one from the United States and one from Wales. Of this number, 45 were free students.

The total net expenditure on all the departments for 1895 was as follows:

(1) College and Government buildings, 331,235.53. (2) Farm—(a) Farm proper, \$2977.70; (b) experimental plots and feeding, \$611,361; (c) dairy school and traveling dairy, \$9518.17; (d) powering department—experiment—wages, stock, 40,31054.34. (3) Horticultural department—garden, greenhouses, orchards, lawn, arboretum etc. \$460,37. (4) Mechanical throad of the control of the control

try department—wages, stoos, stoos, sijos, 34. (3) Horticultural department—garden, greenhouses, orchards, lawn, arboretum, etc., \$469-37. (4) Mechanlos, department—construction of builden, repairs, etc., \$1406.65. Total, \$56,18.72. Unexpended balances on the year's operations in all departments, \$6222.23. The amount paid by the college to arbordents for work in the outside departments in 1895 was \$3321.289.
