## CLEVER WOMAN

## PASSES AWAY

## Mrs. Amelia C. Shadd Wil-

lamson of This City Goes  
to Her Reward

With the death of Mrs. Amelia C.  
Shadd Williamson, at the family  
home at 185 Church street Friday,  
5th inst., there passed away a woman  
who was one of the most gifted and  
best known women of her race in  
Canada.

The deceased lady, who  
was 76 years of age, was the widow  
of the late D. T. Williamson, who  
in the '50s conducted a jewellery  
store on St. Paul street, where Fos-  
ter's bakery is now located, and the  
mother of Mr. A. T. Shadd, the well-  
known jeweller of this city.

When the family left St. Cathar-  
ines they moved to Western Ontario,  
and settled at Chatham, going from  
there later to Washington, D. C.,  
where they resided for a number of  
years. For the past six years she  
has resided with her son, Mr. A. T.  
Shadd, in this city.

For a number of years prior to the  
emanipation of the slaves in the  
United States Mrs. Williamson was  
associate editor of the Provincial  
Freeman, a journal published in Tor-  
onto in the interests of the free col-  
ored people of this country. Her  
brother, Mr. L. D. Shadd, was the  
editor, and the paper having served  
its purpose was discontinued shortly  
after 1865. Mrs. Williamson was by  
religion a Presbyterian. She was the  
only surviving aunt of the paternal  
side of Dr. A. S. Shadd, of Melfort,  
Sask., Conservative candidate for  
the Saskatchewan Legislature at the  
last election.

Her husband predeceased her by  
seventeen years. She is survived by  
three sons, A. T. Shadd of this city,  
who is the third son, but who was  
adopted by his grandfather, Abra-  
ham D. Shadd of Raleigh Township,  
Kent County, Ontario, from whom  
he received his name; L. J. William-  
son, and A. D. Williamson, and two  
daughters, Miss H. S. Williamson of  
Philadelphia, and Mrs. Amelia C.  
Jackson, also of Philadelphia.

The funeral takes place Sunday,  
7th inst. Rev. Dr. Geo. H. Smith,  
moderator of the session of Haynes  
avenue Presbyterian church, with  
which deceased was connected, will  
conduct the services.—Star-Journal,  
St. Catharines.
