UNCLE SAM'S PROPOSAL

WAS ABANDONED Said to Be Such That France and Germany Can Accept.

> Statement From Algeciras Which Heralds Successful Ending of Conference - Ambassador White Only Awaiting the Psychological Moment to Present It-Firm Attitude of Both Powers, But Deadlock Is Denied.

London, Feb. 14 .- The Standard's correspondent at Algedras telegraphed to his paper under yesterday's date: "I am in a position to assert that the final solution of the Moroccan dispute will emanate from America. Ambassa will emanate from America. Ambassa-dor Henry White is only awaiting the right moment to submit a proposal which it is believed will prove accept-able to both France and Germany. I have Mr. White's authority to state that a successful issue confidently is

expected."

Algeciras, Feb. 14.—The reports circulating in European capitals that a crisis has been reached at Algeciras are not warranted by the actual conditions here. The negotiations on the police and finance questions are pro-ceeding uninterruptedly, but have reached a bed rock point on which neither the French nor the German delegates show any disposition to yield. This firmness on both sides has caused some apprehension of an eventual deadlock, but the delegates, so long as the negotiations continue, will not admit that a crisis has been reached.

Interviews took place yesterday morning between Herr Von Radowitz and M. Révoil, respectively, the first delegates of Germany and France to the Moroccan conference, and Count Von Tattenbach and M. Regnault, respectively, the second delegates of Germany and France. The interviews have caused much comment, but nothing has yet transpired as to their result. In Paris.

Paris, Feb. 14.—Prince Radolin, the German Ambassador, had a conference with Premier Rouvier yesterday. A Government note issued last night says Prince Radolin did not submit to Premier Rouvier any new proposition rela-tive to the Moroccan question. All ne-gotiations on that subject, the note adds, necessarily must take place at Algeciras.
